COURSE FORMAT: 4 hours per week for 15 weeks which includes a two week exam period.

COURSE PREREQUISITES/CO-REQUISITES: None

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This is a workshop course for intermediate students. It focuses on the theory and practice of improvisational acting. After an introduction to the fundamental principles of narrative structure and spontaneity, the student explores masks and improvisation as a tool to develop scripted theatre.

COURSE NOTE: For Acting for Stage and Screen and Musical Theatre program students only.

REQUIRED TEXTS AND/OR RESOURCES: Required texts and/or readings will vary by the instructor. They may include plays, books on acting, or samples of scripts.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- Establish and maintain focus in improvisational theatre exercises;
- Demonstrate their understanding of the narrative structure of improvisation in a performance examination;
- Explore a number of types of mask;
- Prepare a scene to be performed for the class.

COURSE CONTENT

The content and week-by-week breakdown of the course will vary by term and instructor. Themes will include different concepts and traditions of improvisation and mask work and applications in performance. The following is a sample:

Week	Course Content
1-3	Introduction to fundamentals of improvization
4-7	Introduction and immersion of long-form improvization
8-10	Continue to develop complex improvised story structure and introduce concepts of mask in performance
11-15	Expand storytelling skills through use of spoken and unspoken soundscapes. Final performances may count as a Final Exam for this course.

ASSIGNMENTS

The assignment structure for this course is determined by the instructor in accordance with the learning outcomes outlined above. Please refer to the course syllabus and eLearn site for a more detailed breakdown.

- 1. Reflection Assignments.** This course may include one or more reflection components, such as an actor's journal, in which students reflect on specific questions or topics regarding their acting process and the craft of improvisation, and/or their progress in class.
- 2. Improvisational Performances:** The narrative skills developed in class will be tested in class through small group performances in both short and long form improv exercises.
- 3. Mask Scene Performances:** A practical examination of short mask scenes, which demonstrate the spontaneity of mask work and the narrative structure of improvisation.
- 4. Professional Practices:** The grade reflects the departments Professional Practices document as laid out in the Student Handbook and the syllabus. Professional Practices and expectations specific to this class will be reviewed by the instructor.
