COURSE FORMAT

4 lecture hours per week for 15 weeks.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

JAZZ 321 with a grade of C+ or higher

The course provides an introduction to choral instructional methods, musical works, and materials suitable for teaching music to students in secondary school choirs and choral music classes. The course is designed to prepare the beginning choral teacher or conductor to use choral methods, literature, and materials for the optimal development of musical skills and musical literacy in young singers in an ensemble.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- apply basic conducting skills learned in JAZZ 320 and 321 to the conducting of choirs;
- research appropriate repertoire for secondary school choirs;
- adapt and arrange basic choral repertoire to suit pedagogical needs and purposes;
- organize and plan lessons and rehearsals;
- teach basic vocal technique and musicianship;
- teach, lead, and rehearse secondary school choirs.

COURSE CONTENT

The course is designed to give students tools for success as choral teachers and leaders. Students will build competency as teachers and develop connections in the profession through observation of accomplished secondary school teachers and conductors. Students will learn to plan and run rehearsals

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and to teach lessons in choral musicianship and technique. Students will become familiar with significant works in the choral repertoire and will learn how to adapt and arrange repertoire to suit a diverse pedagogical needs and purposes. Students will gain practical experience by teaching ensembles comprising class members and, where possible, by working with peers in Capilano University ensembles or with ensembles in local public and private schools.

Academic dishonesty is any act that breaches one or more of the principles of academic integrity. Acts of academic dishonesty may include but are not limited to the following types:

Cheating: Using or providing unauthorized aids, assistance or materials while preparing or completing assessments, or when completing practical work (in clinical, practicum, or lab settings), including but not limited to the following:

- Copying or attempting to copy the work of another during an assessment;
- Communicating work to another student during an examination;
- Using unauthorized aids, notes, or electronic devices or means during an examination;

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- Unauthorized possession of an assessment or answer key; and/or,
- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting
 and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of
 another student from a stack of papers);
- Falsifying one's own and/or other students' attendance in a course;
- Impersonating or allowing the impersonation of an individual;
- Modifying a graded assessment then submitting it for re-grading; or,
- Assisting or attempting to assist another person to commit any breach of academic integrity.
