COURSE FORMAT:

Three hours of class time per week, plus a fourth hour delivered through on-line or other activities, for a 15-week semester, including two weeks for final exams.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

In this course, students will explore the values, goals and assumptions of community-based research and its methodologies. Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to: describe the overall concept of research; explain how community-based research relates to community issues and needs; identify ethical considerations related to research; describe their role as researcher and community member; conduct a basic literature search; demonstrate an experiential understanding of different research methodologies and approaches, such as surveys, interviews, community mapping and community time-lines, photo-voice, focus groups, arts-based research, and participatory action research; demonstrate an experiential understanding of data analysis; and complete and present a small research project
