COURSE FORMAT:

Three instructional hours per week, two lab hours per week, and an additional hour delivered through other activities, per week for a 15-week semester. This includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE PREREQUISITES:

None.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Maps are an essential tool for conveying geographic information, and are also useful for other disciplines that rely extensively on maps and satellite images, such as environmental studies, forestry, geology, archaeology, history, and tourism. This course covers the basic principles of map and photo interpretation, surveying and satellite imaging, and analyses both human and physical landscapes.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

After completing this course students will be able to:

- apply the basic principles of mapping and map analysis to real life mapping exercises
- interpret phenomena presented on various types of maps and remotely sensed products
- calculate distance, direction, and gradient on various types of maps and remotely sensed products
- demonstrate techniques used to analyze maps and remotely sensed images
- use the techniques learned in class to select and analyze data in a research topic
