COURSE PREREQUISITES/CO-REQUISITES

75 credits of 100-level or higher coursework including IBUS 255, ENGL 100, and CMNS 152 or 220

COURSE FORMAT

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Students will acquire knowledge and develop skills in cross-cultural leadership and management for business, including cross-cultural management, leadership style, motivation, negotiation skills, conflict resolution, and cross-cultural ethics.

REQUIRED TEXTS AND/OR RESOURCES

There is no required text for this course. Some resources will be distributed in class as noted in the course content. Students are expected to find additional research resources.

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- Identify and assess the cross-cultural challenges embedded in conflict and negotiation accurately.
- Understand the relationship between culture and communication as it pertains to international business, particularly in the realms of conflict resolution and negotiation.
- Exhibit proficiency in identifying culturally-related issues as they arise in business situations.
- Design culturally specific problem-solving strategies to address culturally complex cross-cultural business challenges.
- Defend self-selected culturally relevant strategies for dealing effectively with these issues.
- Demonstrate ethical cross-cultural behaviours in negotiation, conflict, and a wide range of business situations.
- Identify and explain the concepts and challenges surrounding cultural sustainability.

Violations of academic integrity, including dishonesty in assignments, examinations, or other academic performances, are prohibited and will be handled in accordance with the Student Academic Integrity Procedures.

Academic dishonesty is any act that breaches one or more of the principles of academic integrity. Acts of academic dishonesty may include but are not limited to the following types:

Cheating: Using or providing unauthorized aids, assistance or materials while preparing or completing assessments, or when completing practical work (in clinical, practicum, or lab settings), including but not limited to the following:

- Copying or attempting to copy the work of another during an assessment;
- Communicating work to another student during an examination;
- Using unauthorized aids, notes, or electronic devices or means during an examination;
- Unauthorized possession of an assessment or answer key; and/or,
- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of another student from a stack of papers);
- Falsifying one's own and/or other students' attendance in a course;
- Impersonating or allowing the impersonation of an individual;
- Modifying a graded assessment then submitting it for re-grading; or,
- Assisting or attempting to assist another person to commit any breach of academic integrity.

Sexual Violence and Misconduct
