COURSE FORMAT:

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15 week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course acquaints students with a representative selection of literature by a variety of women writers from the late 19th-century onwards, focusing thematically on the construction of female identity and the changes that identity has undergone. Students will be encouraged to read and react to literary texts (poems, plays, fiction, memoirs) by women both intellectually and emotionally, and to see the extra dimension of live theatre as an expression of social commentary.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Apply critical thinking skills both orally and in formal critical essays within the context of feminist literary theory
- Recognize how women writers' use of literary devices contributes to a female authorial voice and sense of identity.
- Work within a collaborative learning environment in order to establish the strengths (and possible weaknesses) of approaching women writers as a select group
