COURSE FORMAT:

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15 week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE PREREQUISITES:

Note: Completion of WGST 100 and/or WGST 111 is recommended.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The focus of the course will be the impact of gender, from a psychological perspective, on individual women and society. This course will examine how gender is structured by culture, race/ethnicity, class, sexual orientation, and being able-bodied. We will look at what gender is, what it does, how it is expressed in images and other communication, and consider whether there are fundamental differences between women and men. We will also look at how gender develops over the life span, bodily objectification of women, and gendered life paths including commitments in close relationships, mothering, and work. Finally, we will examine the sexist bias which persists in defining psychological disorders in women, and look at transformation of self and society.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Apply psychological theories in order to examine how gender is constructed over the lifespan
- Analyze and critique discourses regarding women and gender
- Appreciate the complexity of the multiple forces that simultaneously act on the individual assessed through thought papers and class contributions
- Conduct a literature review and present the findings, while maintaining a critical perspective assessed through a research paper
- Collaborate with other students in small groups to deliver an interactive presentation assessed through a group presentation

ASSIGNMENTS:

Research Paper:

A term paper comprising of an in-depth critique of the psychological literature on any of the topics covered in the course. Students should consult PsycINFO, PsycARTICLES, and/or other lists of relevant books and articles to identify appropriate publications that need to be included.

Group Presentations:

Each group will select a particular topic related to the psychology of women and gender that has not been discussed in class. The groups will present their findings to the class in a 25 minute presentation.

Assignments – continued

<u>Thought Papers:</u> Two thought papers (maximum 2 pages each, double spaced) in which students

will critically reflect on the readings for that week.

Critical Reading Assessment:

Reading tests will assess students' ability to critically analyze the assigned readings and lecture materials.

4th hour Activity – Moodle discussion forum:

Students will identify a news story or current event, and post a link to the source on the Moodle discussion forum, and also post 2-3 critical thinking questions related to the story in order to stimulate discussion.

Participation: The participation grade is based on attendance and the general quality of

contributions to the class over the course of the semester. It will be the quality, more than the quantity, of class preparation and participation that will count.
