CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course is a certification level course for industry as designated by Avalanche Canada - Avalanche Skills Training course Level 1. In this course students learn how to recognize avalanche terrain, understand the avalanche forecast, plan trips, and perform a companion rescue.

Upon successful completion students will receive Avalanche Canada certification Level 1.

COURSE NOTE

This course consists of one pre-trip planning session plus two one-day field experiences

LEARNING OUTCOMES

1. Apply skills that demonstrate competencies in winter travel and avalanche awareness to an intermediate level of competency, as required by industry standard.

- 2. Design and deliver a small group recreational experience in the winter environment.
- 3. Outline the aspects of the Avalanche Canada "Hazard Model" for decision making.
- 4. Describe how to safely cross an avalanche slope, and organize and safely conduct a small group through potential avalanche terrain.
- 5. Perform at a level of intermediate competency a Companion Rescue as designated by Avalanche Canada
- 6. Perform at an intermediate level of competency a snow profile and compression test.

COURSE CONTENT

Session	TOPIC
1	Introduction Classroom Session Avalanche Theory, Snow Pack, Weather, Terrain, the Human component.
2	Decision Making Avalanche safety (making safe travel decisions in avalanche prone regions). Standards set by the Canadian Avalanche Association for Recreational Avalanche Courses.
3	Safety Terrain evaluation, snow pack structure, weather, safe route finding, and rescue techniques.
4	Terrain Evaluation Focusing on travel techniques, decision-making and hazard reduction strategies, group management.
5	Communication Using the language of the avalanche industry to communicate hazards, snow pack descriptions, and weather observations.
6	Group Travel
7	Snow Pack and Weather
8	Field Evaluation

Assignment Descriptions:

Field evaluations: The ability to perform a specific skill at an acceptable or higher level as required by the industry certification.

Leadership skills: The ability to take initiative to motivate and inspire others and responds to the needs of the group and its individuals. Analyzes problems and develops sound alternatives. Takes time to think, acts rationally and avoids shortcuts. Takes charge of situations when needed and without prompting while understanding and respecting when to let others lead.

Technical skills: Demonstrates to an intermediate level of competency the necessary skills for travelling in a winter mountain environment.

Professionalism and Participation: Includes elements of professionalism, attitude, punctuality and teamwork as described in the outdoor recreation management program skills evaluation form.
