COURSE LEVEL: This course provides students with language skills at the EAP 050 level.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: Upon successful completion of this course, students will demonstrate

competence appropriate to this level by being able to:

Grammar/Writing:

- create simple sentences for meaningful communication.
- use grammatical structures taught at this level.

Listening/Speaking:

- understand sentence-length utterances consisting of learned elements in standard content areas.
- successfully handle a variety of interactive, task-oriented and social situations.
- ask and answer questions, initiate and respond to simple statements, and maintain face-to-face conversation.

Pronunciation:

• understand basic pronunciation concepts.

Reading/Vocabulary:

- use a monolingual dictionary.
- expand active and passive vocabulary.
- identify the topic, main ideas, and supporting details of paragraphs.
- use basic inference skills appropriate to this level.

Learning Approaches:

• use classroom interaction skills which are manageable at this level.

2. Listening/Speaking

Develop basic pronunciation skills:

- word stress

- intonation

3. Reading/Vocabulary

- be able to pronounce new vocabulary
- expand vocabulary through word structure (prefixes, suffices and roots)
- use a monolingual dictionary appropriately
- preview selections before reading
- skim passages and identify stated main ideas
- scan passages for specific information
- understand sequence of events in stories
- identify topics, main ideas and supporting details of paragraphs
