COURSE FORMAT: 4 in class hours per week for 15 weeks (including a 2 week exam period)

PREREQUISITES: EAP 090 with a minimum grade of B, the Capilano EAP Placement Test at the EAP 100 level, or an ELA with a minimum score of 128 or other equivalent English Language test scores

COREQUISITE: EAP 100

COURSE LEVEL: This course provides students with advanced academic language skills (reading, writing, listening and speaking) integrated with academic content.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: Upon successful completion of this course, students will demonstrate competence appropriate to this level by being able to:

Reading

- demonstrate comprehension of academic texts.
- demonstrate an understanding of discipline-specific reading approaches.
- distinguish primary and secondary research.
- demonstrate effective note-taking from longer texts.
- assess writer's tone, arguments, and conclusions.

Pronunciation:

- understand and self-correct individual pronunciation difficulties.

Vocabulary

- use vocabulary appropriate in various academic disciplines, including collocations, word forms and parts, and pronunciation.
- accurately use vocabulary from common semantic fields such as cause/effect, comparison/contrast, hedging, increase/decrease, and reporting verbs.
- pronounce vocabulary effectively.

Learning Approaches:

- demonstrate competence in critical thinking skills.
- generate various types of questions and responses: content, inference, criticism, and evaluation.
- acquire and use background knowledge as evidence in academic assignments.
- understand learning approaches in North American colleges and universities.
- acquire some background knowledge specific to certain academic disciplines.
- develop an awareness of types of assignments common at the university course level.
- understand what constitutes cheating and plagiarism in a western academic learning environment.

COURSE CONTENT: This course will prepare students for study in various academic fields.

ACTIVITIES:

Some activities may include:

- participating in role plays and focused discussions
- leading a seminar
- independently researching material using academic resources
- writing a guided research paper
- giving oral presentations, both formal and impromptu
- reading academic journals and textbooks
- critically analyzing and responding to texts and videos
- writing papers which incorporate application of theories and original thinking
- summarizing, paraphrasing and synthesizing articles and videos
- learning idioms and colloquial expressions especially those related to academic contexts
- using lists, notebooks, and/or quizzes to develop vocabulary
- maintaining an oral journal
- listening to a variety of broadcast media

Students must achieve a B+ (77%) or higher in EAP 100 and 101 to register in full-time Capilano University academic courses, satisfying the University's English Language Requirement.

Enrolment in English 100 requires successful completion of an approved essay exam such as the English Diagnostic Test (EDT).

ASSIGNMENTS: Assignments will include activities that integrate language skills with academic content. Students may also attend Counseling Study Skills Workshops and/or visit 100-level academic classes outside of class time.

OPERATIONAL DETAILS:

University Policies: Capilano University has policies on Academic Appeals (including appeal of final grades), Student Conduct, Cheating and Plagiarism, Academic Probation and other educational issues. These and other policies are available on the University website.

Participation: Participation means regular attendance and good preparation demonstrated in class discussions.

Attendance: Regular attendance is required. If you must miss a class, make arrangements with a classmate to hand in any homework due and to explain work required for the following class. You are responsible for all materials and submission of work during your absence.

Missed Exams: All missed exams and quizzes will be graded "0" unless special arrangements are made with the instructor **prior** to the date of the exam or quiz.

Late Assignments: Late assignments will not be accepted without special approval in advance. Late assignments will not be accepted after answers have been given out and explained in class.

Cheating/Plagiarism: All forms of cheating, including plagiarism, are serious offences. The instructor has a right to assign a "0" on the assignment or a letter grade of "F" on the course. A second offence in any course may result in expulsion from the program.

- English Usage:*** English usage is essential AT ALL TIMES in class.
