**COURSE FORMAT:** Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15 week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

**COURSE PREREQUISITES**: 45 credits of 100-level or higher coursework including 6 credits of 100- or 200-level PHIL courses.

**GENERAL OBJECTIVE**: That the student develop the ability to identify and critically analyze moral problems in the field of family ethics, and clarify her/his own values in relation to specific ethical issues that arise in that field.

**SPECIFIC AIMS**: That the student gain a philosophical perspective (a) on topics such as marriage, monogamy, divorce, adultery, and sexual orientation and how they relate to what might be considered optimal family structure, (b) on the ethics of bearing children, the obligations and rights involved in parenting in juxtaposition to the rights of the child and (c) on the duties of grown children to their parents.

There will be one individual or group presentation on the last day that should last no longer than 3 minutes/person. This presentation should focus on an analysis of what readings and/or experiences the individual (or group) found most "mind-altering" during the term, as well as what questions they believe need further investigation. A one-two page summary of how individual (or group) thinking has been altered as a result of this term-long philosophical foray into Family Ethics should be submitted. This assignment will be worth 10 marks.
