COURSE FORMAT

Three hour classes, in-person lecture/mixed mode/*online, plus two six-hour, in-person lab sessions lead by a Physiotherapist and an Occupational therapist, delivered over a 10 week period, for a total of 30 contact hours. Please review course calendar for scheduling details.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

In this course, students will explore current issues emphasized in inclusive education through definition, etiology, prevalence and implications for learning in the various areas of exceptionality. This exploration will be guided by the First Peoples principles of learning and Equity, Diversity and Inclusion values and principles. A practical skills introduction is included; taught by an Occupational Therapist, Physical Therapist, or Registered Nurse.

ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS

Participation

This mark is based on both the frequency and quality of the student's comments, questions, observations, and involvement, with the emphasis on quality. The quality is determined by among other things, the relevance, insight and clarity of remarks. Reading the required readings in advance will support a student's ability to participate. Not attending, being late to class or being late returning from breaks, will impact the overall participation grade.

Constructing School-wide Supports:

Students will use Shelley Moore's model of "layered cake" versus "cupcake" to create a school-wide support system.

Small Group Research Assignment:

Students will choose a topic related to diverse learners and present this research to the class, using six questions posed by the instructor as a guide.

Pecha Kucha Assignment:

Students will synthesize knowledge learned in the small group assignment and transform it into a Pecha Kucha.

Practical skills:

Two six-hour, in-person lab sessions; one session lead by a Physiotherapist and the other lead by an Occupational Therapist. Skills taught and evaluated will focus on the role of the EA when supporting students requiring alternative mobility, eating and feeding supports, transfers and toileting supports.

Open Book Exam:

Students will complete the exam using notes, PowerPoints and handouts from the course.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.
