COURSE FORMAT

15 hours of classroom contact per week for 13 weeks, plus a 2-week final exam period for a 15-week semester. 5 additional hours per week may include direct classroom instruction, workshops, individual or small group meetings, tutorials, and online activities.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

EAP 070 with a minimum grade of B, the Capilano EAP Placement Test at the EAP 080 level, or Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) paper = 480, internet = 45, or English Language Assessment (ELA) = 96, or International English Language Testing System (IELTS) = 5.0 overall, and no one score less than 4.5, Canadian Academic English Language Assessment (CAEL) = 40, or Pearson Test of English (PTE Academic) = 47

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This intensive course provides students with academic language skills integrated with academic content to the EAP 2 level. It includes reading (relating reading to own knowledge, determining accuracy of information), vocabulary building (expanding vocabulary recognition skills, context clue knowledge, making inferences), grammar (accurate and appropriate use of structures), writing (complex and compound-complex sentences, paragraphs and essays), listening (lectures, note taking, oral presentations), speaking (handling complicated tasks and social situations, discussions, narration techniques, debates), and pronunciation (pause fillers, rate of speech, improving diction).

COURSE NOTE

EAP 080 is equivalent to ESLF 060. Duplicate credit will not be granted for this course and ESLF 060.

REQUIRED TEXTS AND/OR RESOURCES

Specific texts, resources and technology will vary depending on the instructor.

The instructor may make use of an assigned textbook and/or instructor-prepared materials made available in class or on eLearn.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Grammar/Writing:

- Demonstrate accuracy in writing mechanics taught at this level.
- Accurately and appropriately use the grammatical structures taught at this level.
- Identify and correct common grammar errors at this level.

- Outline, draft, revise, and edit compositions.
- Write sentences and paragraphs appropriate to this level.

- Develop comprehension and use of idioms and colloquial speech appropriate to this level.
- Orally summarize and report on material appropriate to this level.
- Give academic presentations appropriate to this level.
- Use academic listening skills appropriate to this level.
- Apply listening skills to take organized notes while listening to modified and/or authentic academic lectures.
- Develop listening and speaking skills by engaging with the community through Experiential Learning (EL) activities.

Pronunciation:

- Demonstrate an improvement in fluency and comprehensibility of speech appropriate to this level.
- Demonstrate an ability to self-correct speech.

Reading/Vocabulary:

- Use vocabulary decoding strategies and context clues to determine the meaning of unfamiliar words appropriate to this level.
- Demonstrate understanding and use of a range of vocabulary at this level.
- Use English-English dictionaries effectively.
- Identify and paraphrase topics, main ideas, and supporting details.
- Use inference skills appropriate to this level.
- Demonstrate the ability to read and comprehend a variety of reading passages appropriate to this level.
- Use critical reading skills (e.g. inferencing) appropriate to this level.

- Demonstrate ability to adjust reading rate in response to different reading tasks, appropriate to this level.

Academic Literacy:

- Develop critical thinking skills appropriate to this level.
- Use effective classroom interaction skills appropriate to this level.
- Understand what constitutes cheating and plagiarism in a North American academic learning environment.

Experiential Learning:

- Identify and interact with some of the student support services available on campus.
- Be aware of the services and programs offered by social organizations located in the community.
- Explain personal learning and benefits from participating in various Experiential Learning activities.
- Understand how volunteer work contributes to an understanding of the values of equity, diversity, and inclusiveness.

Honouring Indigenous Ways of Learning and Knowing

- Develop an understanding of Indigenous Peoples and topics.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation (TRC).
- Be aware of key historical events in the colonization of Canada.
- Compare the status of Indigenous languages and cultures from students' own countries and in Canada.
- Understand the importance of land acknowledgements.
- Attend and report on a special event, ceremony, or location important to Indigenous Peoples.

COURSE CONTENT

This course will prepare students for study in various academic fields through the following class activities:

Grammar/Writing**Grammatical Structures:**

- overview of the English verb system
- articles
- clauses: adjective, adverb, noun
- modal auxiliaries
- phrases: adjective, noun, and adverb
- passive voice
- direct and indirect speech
- conditional sentences
- gerunds vs. infinitives
- other grammatical structures as needed, appropriate to this level

Sentence Patterns:

- simple, compound, complex, and compound-complex
- correction of sentence fragments, run-on sentences, and comma splices
- introduction to parallelism

Paragraphs/Compositions:

- prewriting, outlining, and composing for paragraphs
- paragraph types, e.g. narrative, descriptive, comparison/contrast, cause/effect, process, definition, logical division of ideas, opinion
- unity, coherence and cohesion
- introduction to essay writing

Listening/Speaking

- use of language and register in varied situations such as classroom group work or contact assignments
- comprehension and expanded use of idioms and colloquial speech
- discussion strategies to elicit, express, accept, or clarify opinions
- researching and giving a presentation on an academic topic
- note-taking skills and practice
- predicting, guessing meaning from context, recognizing key words
- distinguishing between main ideas and details
- typical explicit lecture markers indicating topic announcement, return to topic, topic shift, definition, expansion, and summary

Pronunciation

- vowels and consonants
- stress/reduction, rhythm, intonation

Reading/Vocabulary

- pronunciation of new vocabulary appropriate to this level
- using common prefixes, suffixes and roots to determine the meanings of unfamiliar vocabulary
- using an English-English dictionary appropriately
- using context to determine the meanings of unfamiliar vocabulary
- identifying topics, main ideas (stated and unstated) and supporting details
- using grammatical knowledge to decode meaning
- identifying rhetorical patterns in reading passages
- reading authentic materials such as newspapers, magazines, and novels
- making predictions about the content of a reading passage
- inferencing skills
- connecting personal knowledge and experiences to ideas in readings
- distinguishing between facts and opinions
- paraphrasing and summarizing ideas in paragraphs
- recognizing citations and source documentation in reading

Note: While the weighting of individual assignments, tests and exams is at the discretion of the instructor, no single assignment, test or exam will exceed 25% of the final total.

Participation

Participation grades are based on completion of homework tasks and class preparation, as well as the consistency, quality, and frequency of contributions to class discussions. Consistency means attending every class, maintaining a positive and respectful presence in the classroom, and actively contributing to discussions on a regular basis. Quality means demonstrating respect for peers and their contributions, listening attentively during lectures and when other students are speaking, and participating in all activities with an open and inquisitive mind.

Experiential Learning (EL)

Students are expected to participate in Experiential Learning activities over the term. Activities that provide experiential learning include volunteer work, attendance at workshops/lectures/special events or a combination of the two. Evaluation of EL is at the discretion of the instructor and may include individual presentations, reflective journals, e-portfolios, and written reports.

Assignments

Assignments include grammar exercises, writing assignments, readings from a variety of sources, and contact work.

Grading System explanation

- Final grades will be weighted 40% Grammar/Writing; 40% Reading/Vocabulary; 20% Listening/Speaking.
- Students must achieve a B (73%) or higher in EAP 080 to register in EAP 090.

English language usage is essential at all times in class. Students are expected to proofread all written work for any grammatical, spelling and stylistic errors. Instructors may deduct marks for incorrect grammar and spelling in written assignments.

Academic dishonesty is any act that breaches one or more of the principles of academic integrity. Acts of academic dishonesty may include but are not limited to the following types:

Cheating: Using or providing unauthorized aids, assistance or materials while preparing or completing assessments, or when completing practical work (in clinical, practicum, or lab settings), including but not limited to the following:

- Copying or attempting to copy the work of another during an assessment;
- Communicating work to another student during an examination;

- Unauthorized possession of an assessment or answer key; and/or,
- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of another student from a stack of papers);
- Falsifying one's own and/or other students' attendance in a course;
- Impersonating or allowing the impersonation of an individual;
- Modifying a graded assessment then submitting it for re-grading; or,
- Assisting or attempting to assist another person to commit any breach of academic integrity.
