COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will examine the development of warfare and its relationship, role and impact on society between 1850 and the nuclear age. Main themes will include: the role of war in contemporary societies, views and attitudes towards war, the technology and science of war, as well as the tactics and strategy of war.

ASSIGNMENTS:

- <u>Midterm Exam</u>: The midterm exam will be drawn from all course-related materials; including lectures, textbook and assigned readings, videos, discussions and audio-visual presentations.
- Essay Assignment: This assignment requires students to research and write an original and meaningful 2500 to 3000 word paper. Your essay will be assessed and graded for form as well as content. Students may likely find it necessary to conduct some of the research at off-campus locations. During the third class instructions for this assignment will be distributed and discussed.
- Final Exam:The final exam will be held during the university's exam period at the end of the
semester. The Registrar's office sets the day, time and place of the exam. If students
must make travel plans before knowing the final exam schedule, then assume our exam
will be on the last day of finals. The final exam will be drawn from all course-related
materials; including lectures, textbook and assigned readings, discussions and audio-
visual presentations.
- Participation:Participation grades are based on several factors including proper preparation for class
and your active and useful participation in group discussions and general class
discussions. Your attitude to the class, towards the material and others will also be
considered. "Make-ups" are not available for missed activities counting towards your
participation grade. Details related to the group discussions (seminars) will be announced
and discussed in class.

Absence from Class:

Announcements:

<u>Missed Exams</u>: No make-ups will be allowed except in the most extreme circumstances. In such circumstances the student is expected to notify the instructor <u>prior</u> to the exam time and to provide proper and appropriate documentation (e.g. a medical certificate). <u>Do not wait until you return to school to contact your instructor</u>. Documentation must cover the entire period of absence, not just the day of the missed task. Absolutely no rescheduling will be allowed for reasons such as holidays or family obligations, and no make ups will be possible for any assignment after grading is complete and the work has been returned to the class.

Incomplete Grades:

Incomplete grades are only awarded under extraordinary circumstances and must be discussed <u>in</u> <u>advance</u> with the instructor.

"Fourth Hour" Activities:

Information and directions related to "Fourth Hour" activities will be discussed during the first class.

English Usage: Students are expected to write in good academic English. Accordingly, all written work should be submitted in clear, well-organized and correctly punctuated sentences within coherently organized paragraphs. Form as well as content will be evaluated.

Essay Assignment Submission and Deadline Policies:

Essays are to be submitted directly to the instructor in person – not mailed, emailed, faxed, slid under a door, transmitted telepathically and/or delivered by any other means. All essays are to be submitted at the beginning of class, on the due date; after that, they are late. Essays submitted on time will be returned with commentary.

Essays submitted to the instructor late, but within two weeks of the original due date and time, will be accepted and not be penalized marks; however, these papers shall receive no instructor comments. Late essays will not be accepted after more than two weeks has passed since the <u>original</u> due date and time. To reiterate, once the instructor starts the class two weeks after the original due date, no paper shall be accepted no matter what disaster has befallen a student regardless of the cause.

Classroom Decorum:

Classroom learning is a cooperative process. It is expected that every student shall help to facilitate this practice. It is also expected that every student shall treat all other participants in a respectful manner.

Use of Electronic Devices during Class:
