COURSE FORMAT: 2 hours of instruction per week for 15 weeks.

COURSE PREREQUISITES: TECT 210 Senior Production and Theatrical Design I.

Communication:

- Demonstrate leadership and personal skills in the workspace;
- Display spatial awareness in individual and group settings on a crew;
- Employ well developed personal skills and an awareness of self in individual and group settings.

Critical Thinking:

- Understand and identify with the content of the text as it applies to the design;
- Investigate and problem solve in a collaborative team setting;
- Integrate the techniques of creative process into the production areas.

Quantitative Reasoning:

- Employ the tools and technology basic to theatrical production and design;
- Apply measurement skills, problem solving and computation in live entertainment set construction and conceptual design;
- Examine knowledge of physics in lighting and sound design areas;
- Understand and interpret the design areas into a realized form for performance.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

General:

This course will introduce the student to the theory and practice of the duties of senior production personnel. By the end of the course, they should be familiar with the skills necessary to fulfill the duties required of the Technical Director, Designer and Department Heads in Carpentry.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- examine the theory and practice of several duties of senior production personnel;
- identify the design elements of various shows;
- generate and draft a theatrical design concept;
- investigate the duties of Head Carpenter;
- prepare budget analyses for the execution of a theatrical design;
- create models for theatrical designs;
- analyze the various elements of the Technical Director position;
- experience performing the various senior positions in conditions resembling professional practice.

ASSIGNMENTS:

- **1. Construction Drawing:** The student will produce a series of shop drawings, following established guidelines.
- **2. Budgeting:** Students will practice budgeting a show based on a preprepared design.
- **3. Technical Problem Solving:** Students will practice the role of TD and have to creatively solve a problem.

- **4. Model project:** Students will hone their model-making skills by building a white model based off pre-determined designs
- **5. Quiz:** Testing the students on the content of the course as a whole.
- 6. Participation: Full and active participation in classroom discussions and projects is an integral part of this course. Students are expected to show up on time, dressed accordingly, and prepared for the scheduled classroom activities. Work habits and safety practices will also be noted.

OPERATIONAL DETAILS:

University Policies: Capilano University has policies on Academic Appeals (including appeal
