- Integrate the techniques of creative process into the production areas.

Quantitative Reasoning:

- Employ the tools and technology basic to theatrical production and design;
- Apply measurement skills, problem solving and computation in live entertainment set construction and conceptual design;
- Examine knowledge of physics in lighting and sound design areas;
- Understand and interpret the design areas into a realized form for performance.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

General:

The student will develop an understanding of lighting design and instrument operation. They will receive hands on experience with lighting equipment.

Course Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to:

- plan and execute lighting designs;
- analyze the history of stage lighting and its' place in modern theatrical productions;
- exhibit proficiency with lighting equipment;
- understand the use and application of electricity in theatre.

ASSIGNMENTS:

- 1. **Lighting Plot & Paperwork:** Students will choose a play and design a lighting plot for it. They will also have to prepare all related paperwork, including an instrument schedule, a magic sheet and a cue sheet.
- 2. **Focus Demonstration:** Students will design, hang and focus six lights to achieve a particular lighting effect.
- 3. **Mini Scene:** Group project, Students will collectively design, hang and focus, produce and perform a 10 minute mini scene.
- 3. Written Quiz: Students will be quizzed on all the material covered in weeks 1 through 3.
- 4. **Participation:** Full and active participation in classroom discussions and projects is an integral part of this course. Students are expected to show up on time, dressed accordingly, and prepared for the scheduled classroom activities. Work habits and safety practices will also be noted.

University Policies:
