CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course examines the critical role of resource development activities in performing arts and entertainment organizations. Students will develop the skills to construct and deliver effective funding proposals in traditional avenues such as grant writing, corporate sponsorship, and annual fund campaigns as well as social media and online fundraising operations.

- Describe fundraising practices and tools within arts and entertainment environments
- Summarize various funding sources and recommend which ones should be incorporated into a funding strategy for a specific organization

- Construct effective funding and financing proposals, such as grants, sponsorships, and crowdfunding, both verbally and in writing
- Discuss the importance of diversity, equity, and inclusion in the cultivation of donors and investors
- Explain the legal and ethical environment surrounding sponsorships

- Copying or attempting to copy the work of another during an assessment;

- Unauthorized possession of an assessment or answer key; and/or,
- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting
 and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of
