COURSE FORMAT

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams. May be delivered in person, online, or in a mixed-mode format.

45 credits of 100-level or higher coursework; OR 6 NABU credits and CMNS 305

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course provides students with the skills needed to develop community empowerment projects that drive economic and social progress. Students are expected to draw upon knowledge acquired throughout their studies. In this work integrated learning course, students will work in teams and collaborate with local organizations to create and execute projects in their communities. The course aims to inspire and equip students to become responsible leaders who are committed to using their skills and resources to create a better world.

COURSE NOTE:

Students do not need to be a part of Enactus Capilano to take this course.

REQUIRED TEXTS AND/OR RESOURCES

Specific resources, based upon the project selected, will be provided by the instructor and by Enactus Canada. Students will be expected to draw upon Capilano University library resources in support of their project proposal, as well as take advantage of Enactus Canada resources, including applying for project grants if available for project.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

1. Demonstrate an understanding of the Enactus mission and its impact on the world.
2. Cultivate a sense of empowerment and self-direction by planning and implementing a project designed to enhance our communities.
3. Interact with others in groups or teams in ways that contribute to effective working relationships and the achievement of goals.
4. Develop a project idea or contribute to an existing project to address an identified problem that addresses a social and economic issue within a community.
5. Measure and evaluate the impact of an Enactus project on the community.
6. Communicate and present the Enactus project effectively.
7. Apply critical thinking to reflect on the Enactus project experience, identifying opportunities for personal and professional growth.
8. Explain the importance of social entrepreneurship and the role it plays in driving sustainable development.
9. Develop a sense of civic responsibility and an understanding of the importance of community engagement.

Violations of academic integrity, including dishonesty in assignments, examinations, or other academic performances, are prohibited and will be handled in accordance with the Student Academic Integrity Procedures.

Academic dishonesty is any act that breaches one or more of the principles of academic integrity. Acts of academic dishonesty may include but are not limited to the following types:

Cheating: Using or providing unauthorized aids, assistance or materials while preparing or completing assessments, or when completing practical work (in clinical, practicum, or lab settings), including but not limited to the following:

- Copying or attempting to copy the work of another during an assessment;
- Communicating work to another student during an examination;
- Using unauthorized aids, notes, or electronic devices or means during an examination;
- Unauthorized possession of an assessment or answer key; and/or,
- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of another student from a stack of papers);
- Falsifying one's own and/or other students' attendance in a course;
- Impersonating or allowing the impersonation of an individual;
- Modifying a graded assessment then submitting it for re-grading; or,
- Assisting or attempting to assist another person to commit any breach of academic integrity.

Sexual Violence and Misconduct

All Members of the University Community have the right to work, teach and study in an environment that is free from all forms of sexual violence and misconduct. Policy B401 defines sexual assault as follows:
