COURSE FORMAT

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through online or other activities for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

ENG 190; or ENGL 191; or ACTR 100 and ENGL 100

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory workshop in playwriting, covering fundamentals such as dramatic structure, characterization, and dialogue. Students will develop, edit, and rewrite works through readings and feedback. They will explore a variety of approaches to play creation and dramaturgy, which may include but are not limited to Indigenous, Euro-Western, and feminist practices.

COURSE NOTE

ENGL 296 is an approved Culture and Creative Expression course for Cap Core requirements. For the focus of the course each term, see the "Courses" page on the English Department website.

REQUIRED TEXTS AND/OR RESOURCES

Specific texts will vary depending on the instructor and term. They may include plays, books on playwriting, or samples of scripts.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- 1. Investigate, analyze, and practice principles of playwriting.
- 2. Develop their work through in-class readings and feedback.

- 3. Analyze and apply principles of character creation and development.
- 4. Examine theatrical traditions and the influence of systemic racism, colonization, and heteropatriarchal power structures in shaping stage and screen cultures
- 5. Explore a variety of approaches to play creation and dramaturgy, including Indigenous, Euro-Western and feminist practices.
- 6. Identify and assess components of independent show creation, production, and entrepreneurship.
- 7. Produce a portfolio of writing for the stage and screen.

Students who complete this Culture and Creative Expression course will be able to do the following:

- 1. Engage in creative processes including conception, investigation, execution, and ongoing critical analysis.
- 2. Identify, analyze, and critique the elements of a form of expression using its specific vocabulary.
- 3. Explain or demonstrate the connection between various events, ideas, traditions, and belief systems and the modes in which they are artistically or culturally expressed.
- 4. Interpret diverse forms of creative expression from different perspectives (e.g. artistic, historical, Indigenous, literary, scientific, philosophical).

COURSE CONTENT

Creative Writing Assignments

These assignments might include a combination of creative work, such as short plays, scenes, or multiple versions of a scene from different perspectives.

Reflection Assignments

This course may include a reflection component, such as a Writer's Journal, in which students reflect on specific questions or topics regarding their writing process, or include samples of creative work, such as character-building exercises.

Planning & Marketing Assignments

This course may include assignments related to professional planning and marketing. If a playwright wants their play to be produced, their best shot is self-producing, and that requires a range of marketing skills we'll explore. We'll explore how to approach self-production, how to connect with theatre companies, and how to generate assets that will help you help publicists help you.
