with the instructor.

PREREQUISITES: FNLG101

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

FNLG106 will take a communicative approach to language learning and will focus on comprehension. It will incorporate effective language learning strategies such as TPR (Total Physical Response) and TPR Storytelling. The course will use as its guide the short story "Sealiya". The students will acquire vocabulary from this story in Skwxwú7mesh Sníchim (the Squamish language).

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Comprehend the gist of the short story "Sealiya".
- 2. Use various constructions, as exemplified in the short story.
- 3. Give examples of ways to retell the story from one's own perspective.
- 4. Understand the grammatical concepts of including subject and object pronouns, relative clauses, subordinate clauses and demonstratives as first introduced in FNST101.
