COURSE FORMAT:

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15 week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE PREREQUISITES:

45 credits of 100-level or higher course work.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

General:

This course focuses on one of the most perplexing dilemmas in the development process: the phenomenon of massive and historically unprecedented movements of people from the rural countryside to the burgeoning cities of Africa, Asia, and Latin America. Third World urban landscapes are physically and socially transformed by planners and local elites seeking to attract foreign capital and by urban migrants seeking spaces for livelihoods and shelter in an often hostile environment. The rapid pace of this urbanization has created a host of problems that weaken the role of cities as engines of economic growth. Pervasive poverty, inadequate housing, lack of urban services, transportation problems and environmental degradation all contribute to serious problems and challenges. Moreover, the scope and scale of the urban process promises to loom even larger in the future as the pace of urbanization accelerates.

Instructional:

The instructional core of this course will be lectures, text and journal articles. Lectures will both parallel and supplement the course readings. There will also be films and regular discussion periods.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- understand the restructuring of urban form and life in the Global south
- appreciate the expected growth of the population in cities of the Global South
- appreciate the differences of cities in different regions of the Global South
- understand the origins and theories of Third World urbanization
- understand the many spatial forms of urban morphology in the Global south
- challenge the hegemonic liberal and neo-liberal market logics that shape the sociocultural and economic form of cities
- understand the process of 'creative destruction' in urban restructuring practices
