COURSE FORMAT: One four hour class per week for 15 weeks.

COURSE PREREQUISITE: 45 credits of 100 level or higher coursework.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course is intended to bring together students for the purposes of

collaborative innovation. Exposure to diverse perspectives through the momentum of creative team work will engage students in the process of hands-on creative problem solving. Students will practise a selection of fundamental techniques from a variety of visual and performing arts disciplines that provide the material approaches, structures and language for the course work. The goal is to expand students' capabilities within their own field and in their ability to engage in collaborative endeavours.

STUDENT COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- utilize a selection of fundamental techniques from a variety of arts disciplines;
- situate their own process within the field of collaborative, intradisciplinary and/or interdisciplinary work;
- employ a diversified creative vocabulary that extends the current approaches in their field or discipline;
- perceive relationships between previously unconnected materials and concepts;
- innovate by applying different or new approaches to their own creative process;
- create a collaborative network.

REQUIRED TEXT: Selected readings will be distributed in class and through Moodle.

RECOMMENDED READINGS: In addition to the required reading, a list of recommended readings will

be provided.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS:

Assignment 1 Data Bank: Each individual student will collect responses to in-class activities,

collaborative exercises and project critiques as well as source materials for collaboration that will aid in clarifying students' creative methods.

Assignment 2 Conceptual Web: Working within groups, students discuss, explore and create an

enactment to share with the class based on the richest section of the

conceptual web developed the previous week.

Assignment 3 Site and Lens

Response:

Working within collaborative groups on location, students will produce a

site-specific response to their assigned site, from the particular

perspective of the 'lens' drawn from a hat. All groups share their work

with the class during critique.

Assignment 4 Reflection

Summary:

The individual student summarizes the principles and methods covered in 'discipline perspectives' articulating how students see these

informing their own creative process and practices.

Assignment 5 Final Project: The Final Project is student-generated and is a collaboratively developed

group presentation that must employ previously explored principles,

concepts and media-based processes.

OPERATIONAL DETAILS:

University Policies: Capilano University has policies on Academic Appeals (including appeal

of final grades), Student Conduct, Cheating and Plagiarism, Academic Probation and other educational issues. These and other policies are

Attendance: Regular attendance is essential.

Penalties for Missing Class: Students who miss more than 10% of classes will not receive credit for

the course.

Responsibility for Material Covered during a Missed Class

When students are absent from class, they are still responsible for the material covered during their absence, including announcements,

assigned readings and handouts.

Punctuality: Punctuality is essential.

Penalties for Lateness: Students more than 15 minutes late for class will be marked absent.

Participation: The grade for class participation is based on both the frequency and the

quality of the student's comments, questions and observations, with the emphasis on quality. The quality is determined by, among other things, the

relevance, insight and clarity of remarks.

Late Assignments: Acceptance of Late Assignments

Late assignments will only be accepted if **prior** approval for a late

submission date has been given by the instructor.

Penalties for Late Assignments

Marks will only be deducted for the late submission of assignments. The

penalty for the late submission of an assignment is 10% per week.

Incomplete Grades: Assignment of Incomplete

Students who fail to meet deadlines during the semester will not be granted an Incomplete "I". Arrangements should be made in writing between the instructor and the student, specifying the exact nature of the work to be

done and the date it is to be submitted.

Conditions for Granting an Incomplete

Grades of Incomplete "I" will be granted only if there is a valid reason for extending the evaluation deadline and if students have a reasonable chance

of improving their grade to pass the course.

Grades of Incomplete "I" will be given only if there is an arrangement **or** a written request approved by the instructor **prior** to the last class in the

course or the last week of class.

Reversion of Incomplete Grades

If the date for the submission of incomplete assignment is not met, the grade will automatically revert to the grade based on the student's present

achievements.

Cheating/Plagiarism:

Definition of Plagiarism
