

COURSE FORMAT: 2 lecture hours per week for 15 weeks

PREREQUISITE: JAZZ 370 with grade of C- or higher

MISSION STATEMENT: The Capilano University Jazz Studies Program seeks to foster

students' comprehensive abilities in jazz performance and composition within the context of an enriched liberal arts education. Our goal is to develop musicians who understand and value the rich history and traditions of jazz, who will be prepared to contribute to the evolution and growth of the art form in the future and who will be equipped to engage creatively

with current trends in music.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: The course introduces students to the methods of ethnomusicology with an

emphasis on musical cultures outside of Western Europe. The course will include not only the description of characteristic musical attributes for each

cultural region but it will also involve the application of basic ethnomusicological concepts to individual musical contexts.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

- aurally identify musical recordings by title, country, and performer, as well as explain the style characteristics of each piece;
- describe the social, spiritual, cultural and geographical influences on musical practices and traditions;
- identify instruments and ensembles and discuss music using appropriate terminology;
- investigate and describe musical experiences outside of their native cultural group using methods that are objective and culturally sensitive.
- appreciate and describe relationships among different musical traditions;
- apply aural skills gained in the Jazz Studies program to the analysis of music from a variety of cultures.

Exams There will be one two-hour midterm exam and one final three-hour exam. The

midterm will focus on introductory material, Africa, and India. The final exam will be cumulative. Test format will be short essays, multiple choice, descriptions and definitions of certain terms, listing of facts, as well as short objective questions. The

midterm and the final exam will include a listening component.

Concert Report Students will attend a live music concert that features music from outside their own

culture and write a 500-750 word report. Report may be submitted any time before

the last day of classes.

Group Presentation Students will be placed in a small group and research and create a short

(10-20 minutes) group "performance" connected to one of the music cultures

examined in the course.
