COURSE OBJECTIVES:

General:

This course will familiarize students with the terminology, skills, and equipment necessary to function as a member of a set construction crew.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- understand safe work practice and general shop safety
- use hand and power tools
- build from scale drawings and blueprints
- understand the function and form of stage scenery
- choreograph scene change movement and mechanics
- begin to develop scenic construction methods and materials

ASSIGNMENTS:

Carpentry Project #1 - is done as a team effort, building actual set units for a Theatre Department production.

Carpentry Project #2 – Is a multi-part project that requires the student to research, design, build and finish an assignment determined by the instructor.

Written Test – This test will encompass the methods of design, research, safety, procedure planning, materials, and hardware taught during in the course

Practical Skills Test – This test will test the student's ability to complete a series of tool related tasks, keeping proper procedure and safety in mind.

Participation - Full and active participation in classroom discussions and projects is an integral part of this course. Students are expected to show up on time, dressed accordingly, and prepared for the scheduled classroom activities. Work habits and safety practices will also be noted.
