This course will familiarize students with sound and audio terminology, skills and equipment used in live and studio sound production.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- identify various types of sound, recording and playback equipment;
- maintain audio equipment;
- set up and run an audio system;
- set up an audio system for recording purposes;
- evaluate proper use of recording equipment;
- work as a sound technician on a theatrical production.
