COURSE FORMAT

Pre-trip planning session plus an extended field excursion of 5 days and 4 nights

COURSE PREREQUISITES/COREQUISITES

REC 148, WLP 149 and WLP 126 as pre- or co-requisites

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Building on skills, knowledge, and certifications earned in previous courses students will be on an extended alpine mountain field excursion in summer and fall like conditions, including glacier travel. The course provides ample opportunity for students to deepen their interpersonal skills, work within a team and engage in a support role to the leader on a mountain traverse.

COURSE NOTE

This course consists of one pre-trip planning session plus a five day overnight field trip.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- 1. Plan a multi-day trip through an alpine area, including travel in a variety of terrain and ascent of one or more peaks.
- 2. Assess the alpine environment including weather, geology and ecology and their impact on alpine travel and decision making.
- 3. Demonstrate basic rock climbing and rope management skills.

- 4. Select appropriate routes and techniques for travel in rocky mountainous terrain.
- 5. Select appropriate routes and develop techniques for competently travelling on snow.
- 6. Demonstrate basic competency for travel in glaciated terrain.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.
