SCC was requested to approve the new courses, CRIM 304 – Law and Society, CRIM 490 – Directed Studies and SOC 490 – Directed Studies, as well as designation of Cap Core under the heading of *Self and Society* to CRIM 304 – Law and Society.

The following revisions were requested on the floor for CRIM 304:

- The minimums for the categories under the evaluation profile currently add up to 105%. As such, a request was made to revise the term paper evaluation to “20 – 30%” and the Midterm Exam to “20 – 30%”.
- In the interest of having a clean course outline that does not resemble a syllabus, the presenter requested that the readings list be removed from the course content.

There was a discussion with regard to the wording of the course format for CRIM 490 and SOC 490 that specific details may not give a student a true sense of the course. As there is no standard language, a suggestion was made to use previous language used by the LSBA as follows: “Specific course details will be arranged between individual students and faculty advisors”.

SCC was requested to approve the two new courses, EDUC 485 – Postqualitative Methodologies and EDUC 505 – Childhoods, as well as the corresponding revisions to the Early Childhood Care and Education Post Baccalaureate Diploma and Bachelor of Early Childhood Care and Education program profiles as a result of the addition of the new courses.

On review of the courses, it was requested that under the evaluation profile for EDUC 505, the minimum of the evaluation ranges be changed from “0” to “5”.

Concern was also raised that EDUC 485 is being offered as a 400-level course with no prerequisites. In this regard, it was suggested that the standard language be added as the prerequisites.

- 19/26** “12 credits of 300-level or higher coursework” be added as prerequisites for EDUC 485 – Postqualitative Methodologies. **CARRIED**

- 19/27** The two new courses, EDUC 485 – Postqualitative Methodologies and EDUC 505 – Childhoods, be recommended to Senate for approval. **CARRIED**
