COURSE FORMAT

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams. This course may be delivered online, blended or offered in mixed-mode.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

60 credits of 100-level or higher coursework

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course provides students with technical knowledge and skills to manage the Human Resources function in a tourism and hospitality management organization, carrying out generalist duties. It also enables students to assist the director of a Human Resources Department in a larger operation in a more specialized role, or to carry out the HR duties of a line manager.

COURSE NOTE

TOUR 471 is an approved Self and Society course for Cap Core requirements.

TOUR 471 is equivalent to TOUR 422. Duplicate credit will not be granted for this course and TOUR 422.

- 1. **Analyze** trends and challenges in human resource management to understand the future of work.
- 2. **Develop** a recruitment plan with job design, forecasting employment needs and principles of diversity, equity and inclusion.

3. **Create** and deliver a training plan to manage talent through training, learning and employee performance

- 4. **Organize** total reward systems for various levels of employees to support engagement and retention
- 5. **Identify** key issues in Human Capital Development as it relates to labour relations and the law.

Students who complete this Self and Society course will be able to do the following:

- 1. Identify potential root causes of local/global problems and how they affect local/global cultures, economies, politics, and policies.
- 2. Analyze the impact of colonialism and racism on Indigenous peoples.
- 3. Synthesize a range of differing community perspectives on ethics and justice and explain how these perspectives can inform structural change.
- 4. Explain how contexts (e.g. cultural, historical, colonial, economic, technological) shape identity formation and social structures.

Cheating: Using or providing unauthorized aids, assistance or materials while preparing or completing assessments, or when completing practical work (in clinical, practicum, or lab settings), including but not limited to the following:

- Copying or attempting to copy the work of another during an assessment;
- Communicating work to another student during an examination;
- Using unauthorized aids, notes, or electronic devices or means during an examination;
- Unauthorized possession of an assessment or answer key; and/or,
- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting
 and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of
 another student from a stack of papers);
- Falsifying one's own and/or other students' attendance in a course;
- Impersonating or allowing the impersonation of an individual;
- Modifying a graded assessment then submitting it for re-grading; or,
- Assisting or attempting to assist another person to commit any breach of academic integrity.
