#### **PURPOSE**

To request Senate's approval of the revised Graduation Policy, S2017-04, on its regular review schedule and after incorporating content related to graduate programs.

#### **BACKGROUND**

(the proponent has provided most of the following information)

#### Rationale for creation, revision or rescinding

This policy was written and approved in 2017 and is overdue for its planned 5-year review. Additionally, the policy was reviewed as part of the University's preparations for introducing graduate studies.

#### Context

This policy provides direction regarding Capilano University requirements for graduation from credit-based programs.

#### **Issues identified**

No significant issues have been identified associated with the directions provided or operationalization of this established policy.

#### **Changes**

The only changes being made to this policy are the inclusion of minimum University requirements for graduation from master's level credentials and some clarifications about undergraduate graduation requirements. Additionally, some changes have been made to align with current policy office practices.

#### Risk, Benefits and Strategy alignment

This policy forms a part of the controls mitigating risk associated with graduation by putting in place minimum requirements and a consistent process.

#### **CONSULTATIONS**

The new graduation from master's level credentials requirements were drafted by the AVP CARS, Dawn Whitworth, after a comparative review of other BC PSIs. The language was shared and feedback and changes incorporated during a consultation roadshow held in May/June 2023 that included all Faculty Councils.

The Registrar's Office led by the Graduation Associate Registrar, Jaspreet Jhutti, reviewed and updated the existing policy as a whole and identified only minor changes to be made. Policy Office review was



completed with some additional small changes made. It was determined that further consultation was not required.

#### 1. PURPOSE

1.1. This policy provides direction regarding the university requirements for graduation from credit-based programming. This policy relates to all credit-based programs and includes the timeframe for completion of programs, second credentials, graduation Grade Point Averages (GPAs), residency, and other graduation-related items.

#### 2. SCOPE

2.1. Capilano University shall confer approved credentials to students who meet the specific program requirements in addition to the university standards as detailed in this policy including: 1) Meeting the requirements for graduation; 2) Applying and being deemed eligible for graduation; and 3) Receiving the parchment.

## 3. MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

- 3.1. All students applying for graduation must meet the specific program profile requirements as approved by Senate and published in the University Calendar at the time the student is first enrolled in the program.
- 3.2. If a student stops out of their program for more than two (2) sequential major terms (Fall/Spring or Spring/Fall), the student will be evaluated against the program profile for the term of their graduation. If they do not meet those requirements, the student will be evaluated against the program requirements that are in effect at the time they re-entered the program.
- 3.3. Students wishing to have their graduation application evaluated according to the program profile requirements of a term other than as described above must submit such a request to the Registrar when applying for graduation.

- 3.4. It is the student's responsibility to ensure that all requirements for the program, including Cap Core requirements, will be met within the term of application.
- 3.5. Students who have received permission to complete coursework elsewhere must complete this work and submit a final, official transcript from the other institution(s) at least four (4) months prior to applying for graduation.

#### 4. GRADUATION CUMULATIVE GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA) REQUIREMENT

- 4.1. The minimum University requirement for graduation from all credentials is a CGPA of 2.00. All courses completed at Capilano University within the program requirements are used in the calculation of the Graduation CGPA.
- 4.2. Programs may have additional graduation requirements as approved by the University Senate.

#### 5. RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT

- 5.1. Students transferring to Capilano University must complete a minimum of 50% of their program course credits at Capilano University, the majority of which will normally fulfill the requirements of their final years of study. For example, within a Baccalaureate credential these course credits would be at the 3xx and 4xx level.
- 5.2. Programs may have other residency requirements. These requirements will be included in the program requirements approved by the University Senate as listed within the University Calendar.

#### 7. TIMEFRAME FOR COMPLETION OF THE PROGRAM AND GRADUATION

- 7.1. Students are expected to complete the requirements for their program within a reasonable timeframe. The reasonable timeframe for each program is defined as twice the duration of the Senate approved program length plus an additional 50%. For example, students in a four-year program would be given ten years from the first term of registration to complete their program. Students in a two-year program would be given five years to complete their program.
- 7.2. Students are eligible to graduate from their program up to five years from the completion of their program requirements. Students requesting an extension to that time limit must do so in writing to the Vice-President Academic and Provost.
- 7.3. Students may attend the convocation ceremony that immediately follows their graduation.

#### 8. EXEMPTIONS/SUBSTITUTIONS OF COURSES FOR GRADUATION

- 8.1. Students are expected to meet the requirements of their program as outlined in the profile approved by the University Senate.
- 8.2. Any request for an exemption from or substitutions for a program course requirements must be recommended by the dean and approved by the Registrar's Office.

#### 9. APPLICATION FOR GRADUATION

9.1. To obtain a credential from Capilano University, all students must be approved for graduation. Students must submit an application for graduation that will be reviewed for eligibility. If eligible, the student will be approved for graduation by the Registrar.

Application deadlines are posted on the Capilano University website.

#### 10. GRADUATION ELIGIBILITY

10.1. Graduation eligibility is determined by the Registrar. Students will be notified of their eligibility as soon as possible after their graduation application is received; however, final eligibility is not confirmed until all courses have been completed and final grades are received, including grades from practicums, study abroad programs, transfer credit, or other coursework.

#### 11. RECEIPT OF PARCHMENT

11.1. Summer or Fall term graduation – Students who have met all their financial commitments to the institution and who graduate after Summer or Fall term are eligible to receive their parchments following approval of the University Senate.

11.2. Spring Term graduation – Following approval of the University Senate, students who have met all their financial commitments to the institution and who graduate after Spring term will receive their parchments at Convocation. Students who do not attend Convocation will receive their parchments following Convocation.

#### 12. REPLACEMENT CREDENTIALS

- 12.1. If there has been an error in the printing of the original document, the original credential must be returned to Capilano University to receive a replacement credential.
- 12.2. If the original credential was lost, stolen, or destroyed a signed "Lost Credential Declaration" form must be completed and submitted to the Registrar's Office to receive a replacement credential.

#### 1. PURPOSE

1.1 This policy provides direction regarding Capilano University (the "University") requirements for graduation from credit-based programs. This policy relates to all credit-based programs and includes the timeframe for completion of programs; conferring of first and second credentials; the required graduation Grade Point Averages (GPAs), and residency; and other graduation-related items.

#### 2. SCOPE AND LIMITS

- 2.1 The University will confer approved credentials on students who meet the specific program requirements in addition to the university standards as detailed in this policy including:
  - a) meeting the requirements for graduation;
  - b) applying and being deemed eligible for graduation; and
  - c) receiving the parchment.

#### 3. MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

- 3.1 All students applying for graduation must meet the specific program profile requirements as approved by the Senate and published in the University Calendar at the time the student is first enrolled in the program.
- 3.2 If a student stops out of their program for more than two (2) sequential major terms (Fall/Spring or Spring/Fall), the student will be evaluated against the program profile for the term of their graduation. If they do not meet those requirements, the student will be evaluated against the program requirements that are in effect at the time they re-entered the program.
- 3.3 Students wishing to have their graduation application evaluated according to the program profile requirements of a term other than as described above must submit such a request to the Registrar when applying for graduation.

- 3.4 It is the student's responsibility to ensure that all requirements for the program, including Cap Core requirements, are met within the term of application for graduation.
- 3.5 Undergraduate students who have received permission to complete coursework elsewhere must need to complete this work and submit a final, official transcript from the other institution(s) at least four (4) months prior to applying for graduation.

#### 4. GRADUATION CUMULATIVE GRADE POINT AVERAGE (CGPA) REQUIREMENT

- 4.1 The minimum University requirement for graduation from all undergraduate credentials is a CGPA of 2.00. All courses completed at Capilano University within the program requirements are used in the calculation of the graduation CGPA. (See Policy S2003-02 Repeated Courses for information about GPA calculation when a course is repeated.)
- 4.2 The minimum University requirement for graduation from master's level credentials is a CGPA of 3.00. Graduate certificates and graduate diplomas require a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.67 or higher. All courses completed at the University within the program requirements are used in the calculation of the graduation CGPA.
- 4.3 Programs may have additional graduation requirements as approved by the Senate.

#### 5. RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT

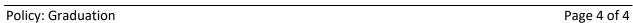

#### **PURPOSE**

To request Senate's approval of the revised Academic Honours Policy, S1989-02, on its regular review schedule and after incorporating content related to graduate programs.

#### **BACKGROUND**

#### Rationale for creation, revision or rescinding

This policy was originally written in 1989 and last updated in 2011 and is overdue for its planned 5-year review.

#### **Context**

This policy provides direction regarding the awarding of academic honors (Deans and Merit lists).

#### **Issues identified**

No significant issues have been identified associated with the directions provided or operationalization of this long-established policy.

#### **Changes**

The changes proposed to this policy are very minor, to include Graduate credentials and requirements in the Graduation Honors section and some changes made to align with current policy office practices.

#### Risk, Benefits and Strategy alignment

This policy forms a part of the controls mitigating risk associated with the awarding of academic honours. The new language relating to graduate credentials forms part of the preparation for the university to launch graduate studies.

#### **CONSULTATIONS**

The new language regarding graduate credentials was drafted by the AVP CARS, Dawn Whitworth, after a comparative review of other BC PSIs. The language was shared and feedback and changes incorporated during a consultation roadshow held in May/June 2023 that included all Faculty Councils.

The Registrar's Office and the Policy Office reviewed and updated the existing policy as a whole and identified some other minor changes to be made. It was determined that further consultation was not required.

There are two types of academic honours at Capilano University: term honours and graduation honours.

#### 1. Term Honours

#### 1.1 Dean's List

Students who fulfill the following conditions in a given term will be awarded standing on the Dean's List:

- achieve a minimum of 3.67 on their Term Grade Point Average (TGPA),
- have no "Incompletes", no "No Credits Granted" and no "Fail" grades, and
- complete a minimum of 12 credits for the term.

#### 1.2 Merit List

Students who fulfill the following conditions in a given term will be awarded standing on the Merit List:

- achieve a minimum of 3.67 on both their TGPA and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA),
- have no "Incompletes", no "No Credits Granted" and no "Fail" grades, and
- complete fewer than 12 credits for the term.

Students who achieve Dean's List or Merit List standing receive a congratulatory letter from the University recognizing their achievement.

Dean's List/Merit List designation is recorded on the permanent student record and shall appear on the student's official transcript of academic record.

#### 2. Graduation Honours

#### 2.1 Graduation with Distinction—all credentials except Bachelor Degrees

Students are eligible for the Graduation with Distinction if they fulfill the following conditions:

- complete a Capilano University credential of 30 or more credits of which no more than 20% of the program's credits can be Credit/No Credit grades,
- achieve a minimum CGPA of 3.75, based on courses used to satisfy program requirements,
- have no grade lower than C+ in the program requirements.

While credit may be given for transfer, equivalence, and so forth, the associated grades will not be used in calculating the program CGPA.

Graduation with Distinction is recorded on the permanent student record and shall appear on the student's official transcript of academic record and on the parchment.

#### 2.2 Graduation with Distinction—Bachelor Degrees

Students are eligible for the Graduation with Distinction if they fulfill the following conditions:

- complete a Capilano University Degree in which no more than 20% of the credits can be Credit/No Credit grades,
- achieve a CGPA of 3.75 based on 300 and 400 level courses used to satisfy Capilano requirements,
- have no grade lower than C+ in the program requirements at the 300/400 level.

While credit may be given for transfer, equivalence, and so forth, the associated grades will not be used in calculating the program CGPA.

Graduation with Distinction is recorded on the permanent student record and shall appear on the student's official transcript of academic record and on the parchment.

  - c) complete fewer than 12 credits for the term.
- 2.3 Students who achieve Dean's List or Merit List standing receive a congratulatory letter from the University recognizing their achievement.
- 2.4 Dean's List/Merit List designation is recorded on the permanent student record and will appear on the student's official transcript of academic record.

#### 3. GRADUATION HONOURS

Graduation with Distinction—Diplomas all credentials except Undergraduate and Graduate Degrees

- 3.1 Students are eligible for the Graduation with Distinction if they fulfill the following conditions:
  - a) complete a University credential of 30 or more credits of which no more than 20% of the program's credits can be Credit/No Credit grades,
  - b) achieve a minimum CGPA of 3.75, based on courses used to satisfy program requirements,
  - c) have no grade lower than C+ in the program requirements.
- 3.2 While credit may be given for transfer, equivalence, and so forth or both, the associated grades will not be used in calculating the program CGPA.
- 3.3 Graduation with Distinction is recorded on the permanent student record and will appear on the student's official transcript of academic record and on the parchment.

Graduation with Distinction—Bachelor Degrees Undergraduate and Graduate Degrees

- 3.4 Students are eligible for the Graduation with Distinction if they fulfill the following conditions:
  - a) complete a Capilano University Degree in which no more than 20% of the credits can be Credit/No Credit grades,
  - achieve a CGPA of 3.75 based on 300 and 400 level courses for undergraduate degrees or a CGPA of 3.75 based on 500 or higher level courses for graduate degrees used to satisfy Capilano requirements,
  - c) have no grade lower than C+ in the program requirements at the 300/400 level for undergraduate degrees or 500 or higher level for graduate degrees.
- 3.5 While credit may be given for transfer or equivalence, and so forth or both, the associated grades will not be used in calculating the program CGPA.
- 3.6 Graduation with Distinction is recorded on the permanent student record and will appear on the student's official transcript of academic record and on the parchment.

#### 1. PURPOSE

This policy provides direction regarding the awarding of academic honours at Capilano University (the "University").

#### 2. TERM HONOURS

#### **Dean's List**

- 2.1 Students who fulfill the following conditions in a given term will be awarded standing on the Dean's List:
  - a) achieve a minimum of 3.67 on their Term Grade Point Average (TGPA),
  - b) have no "Incompletes", no "No Credits Granted" and no "Fail" grades, and
  - c) complete a minimum of 12 credits for the term.

#### **Merit List**

- 2.2 Students who fulfill the following conditions in a given term will be awarded standing on the Merit List:
  - a) achieve a minimum of 3.67 on both their TGPA and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA),
  - b) have no "Incompletes", no "No Credits Granted" and no "Fail" grades, and
  - c) complete fewer than 12 credits for the term.
- 2.3 Students who achieve Dean's List or Merit List standing receive a letter from the University recognizing their achievement.
- 2.4 Dean's List/Merit List designation is recorded on the permanent student record and will appear on the student's official transcript of academic record.

#### 3. GRADUATION HONOURS

#### **Graduation with Distinction—Diplomas**

- 3.1 Students are eligible for the Graduation with Distinction if they fulfill the following conditions:
  - a) complete a University credential of 30 or more credits of which no more than 20% of the program's credits can be Credit/No Credit grades,
  - b) achieve a minimum CGPA of 3.75, based on courses used to satisfy program requirements,
  - c) have no grade lower than C+ in the program requirements.
- 3.2 While credit may be given for transfer, equivalence, or both, the associated grades will not be used in calculating the program CGPA.
- 3.3 Graduation with Distinction is recorded on the permanent student record and will appear on the student's official transcript of academic record and on the parchment.

#### **Graduation with Distinction—Undergraduate and Graduate Degrees**

- 3.4 Students are eligible for the Graduation with Distinction if they fulfill the following conditions:
  - a) complete a Capilano University Degree in which no more than 20% of the credits can be Credit/No Credit grades,
  - b) achieve a CGPA of 3.75 based on 300 and 400 level courses for undergraduate degrees or a CGPA of 3.75 based on 500 or higher level courses for graduate degrees used to satisfy Capilano requirements,
  - c) have no grade lower than C+ in the program requirements at the 300/400 level for undergraduate degrees or 500 or higher level for graduate degrees.
- 3.5 While credit may be given for transfer or equivalence, or both, the associated grades will not be used in calculating the program CGPA.
- 3.6 Graduation with Distinction is recorded on the permanent student record and will appear on the student's official transcript of academic record and on the parchment.

#### **Guest Speaker**

Our committee hosted a guest speaker: TJ Delegencia Manager, Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI). TJ provided a presentation on the role of DEI at CapU and the alignment to the Strategic Plans as well as a summary of the upcoming initiatives as follows:

CapU DEI Roadmap: A guiding plan for the University's short and long-term DEI and employment equity efforts.

Employee Town Hall – May 7 at 10am (Virtual):

- Progress and key milestones of the DEI Roadmap.
- How the roadmap aligns with *Envisioning 2030* and *People Plan*.
- Overview of the three-stage development process.
- Introduction of the new DEI Advisory Council and shared responsibility.
- Post-Event: Summary, recording and resources will be available on *Frontlines*.

#### **REPORT/UPDATES**

1. Creative Activity, Research, Scholarship and Graduate Studies (CARS) - Dawn Whitworth

CapU has been awarded 2 new faculty-led federal research grants:

- A SSHRC Insight Development grant of \$300k
- A CIHR/NSERC Applied Research Equipment grant of \$150k (The names of the faculty awardees will be announced when the federal government embargo is lifted later in the spring.)

A reminder that April 25<sup>th</sup> is the inaugural *Faculty Research Symposium* and April 26<sup>th</sup> is the annual *Student Research Symposium*.



#### 2. **Digital Technology Services (DTS) -** Chris Jacques

#### Curriculum Management System

- Planning work has started for the implementation of a Curriculum Management System within the University
- An overview of the project was presented to the Deans in March
- Meetings with each Faculty Council have been scheduled for May and June to build awareness amongst all faculty members before the summer break
- Members of the University are currently working with BCNET to evaluate and select a preferred vendor through an NRFPO process with other institutions across BC

#### **Electronic Research Administration Systems**

- Planning work has started for the implementation of an Electronic Research Administration System within the University
- DTS are working with the CARS team to document the processes that the eRAS system must support
- The University has the option to select an application from one of two vendors who were successful proponents in an NRFP process completed by BCNET in 2024

#### 3. Director, Academic Planning and Quality Assurance (AIQA) - Claire Carolan

Claire Carolan, Director, Academic Planning and Quality Assurance provide a written report and some of the key highlights were as follows:

In the coming months, plans will be put forward officially rename the department from AIP, Academic Initiatives and Planning to APQA, *Academic Planning & Quality Assurance* to begin to highlight the critical importance and interconnectedness of quality assurance throughout all of the academic planning.

#### **Existing program portfolio**

Currently, we operate with 5 faculties home to 17 schools, and 1 institute. Our academic programs span a wide array of credentials, including 6 associate degrees, 18 bachelor's degrees, 29 certificates, 6 citations, 25 diplomas, 10 minors, 3 post-baccalaureate certificates, and 3 post-baccalaureate diplomas.

#### Ongoing program development

The Academic Programming and Quality Assurance office currently has 18 new programs in various stages of development, with anticipated launch dates within a 12–24-month timeframe. In addition, 8 existing programs are undergoing curriculum renewal.

#### **Program Review**

**Completion of Cohort A Self-Study Reports:** Cohort A has successfully completed and submitted comprehensive self-study reports under the updated program and unit review



process. These insightful reviews were submitted by the Institute for Interdisciplinary Studies, the School of Humanities, and the School of Allied Health. This initiative supports our institutional commitments under Illuminating 2030 and Envisioning 2030 to foster robust, high-quality academic offerings through ongoing evaluation and reflection.

**External review Institute for Interdisciplinary Studies**: Panelists, Dr. Dana Landry (UFV) and Dr. Shelly Jones (RRU) met virtually over three days with the dean, faculty, staff, and students in the Institute for Interdisciplinary Studies. The reviewers also met with the Associate Vice President and Vice Provost and the Director, Academic Planning and Quality Assurance. Maryam Babu, Program Review Liaison organized and facilitated the successful review. The panelists will submit their report in late April.

External review for School of Humanities: Panelists, Dr. Claire Grogan, Dean of Arts and Humanities, VIU; Darren Bernaerdt, Dean of Arts, Langara; Jacqueline Turner, Interim Dean, Culture & Community, ECUAD met virtually over three days with the dean, faculty, staff, and students from the School of Humanities. The reviewers also met with the Director, Academic Planning and Quality Assurance. Maryam Babu, Program Review Liaison organized and facilitated the successful review. The panelists will submit their report in late April

### **Curriculum Management System search**

The BCNET-led NRFP (negotiated request for proposals) is nearing the end of its process to identify a curriculum management software system to implement and launch before Summer 2026. Participation in this process has been a shared project between APQA, RO and DTS. The implementation is going to necessitate a university-wide course outline update. The change management plan for that important work is a joint initiative between CTE, APQA, DTS and the RO.
