COURSE FORMAT

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams. May be offered online or mixed mode. As an experiential course, in addition to lectures and class discussions, students will be engaged in a project with a local business or community organization.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

45 credits of 100-level or higher coursework; OR 6 NABU credits

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

In today's rapidly changing global landscape, businesses play a pivotal role in shaping a sustainable future. This course introduces students to sustainable business strategy, specifically how sustainability can be a strategic differentiator that can lead to improved environmental, social and financial performance. This course delves into the essential principles and practices of sustainability as defined by the United Nations (UN) and other organizations. Throughout the course, participants will apply sustainability principles to real-world business scenarios.

REQUIRED TEXTS AND/OR RESOURCES

Specific texts, resources and technology will vary depending on term and instructor. The course may make use of an assigned textbook, instructor prepared courseware or readings made available as Open Educational Resources (OER).

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

1. Investigate business strategies for reducing environmental impact, including energy efficiency, waste reduction, and sustainable resource management.
2. Explore various sustainability reporting frameworks and measurement tools to assess and communicate an organization's transparency and sustainability performance.
3. Evaluate the economic impact of new sustainability technologies and initiatives.
4. Examine the diverse cultural, spiritual, and traditional perspectives of Indigenous peoples regarding sustainability, environmental stewardship, and interconnectedness with nature.
5. Build a business case for a sustainability strategy utilizing the UN Framework for Sustainable Development Goals and/or other organizational guidelines.

Case Analyses: Students will analyze and evaluate case studies and current events related to energy efficiency, waste reduction, sustainable resource management, and other sustainability related topics using various frameworks.

Group project: Sustainability Plan: In small teams, students will collaborate with a real company to develop a tailored sustainability plan utilizing the UN Sustainability Framework or other framework discussed in class. They will design, implement, and assess sustainability initiatives and provide recommendations for measuring their impact on environmental, social, and economic aspects.

Personal reflection: Students will prepare reflection piece on their vision for the future of sustainability exploring emerging trends, innovative technologies, and their personal role in fostering a more sustainable world.

- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of another student from a stack of papers);
- Falsifying one's own and/or other students' attendance in a course;
- Impersonating or allowing the impersonation of an individual;
- Modifying a graded assessment then submitting it for re-grading; or,
- Assisting or attempting to assist another person to commit any breach of academic integrity.
