CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

The film and gaming industry demands specialists who produce exemplary work on tight timelines. This course enables students to attain outstanding skills in modeling and texturing. Students will identify a model and texture career specialty and create an industry-focused, self-directed portfolio and demo reel that targets industry for employment. Regular peer reviews, group critiques and mentoring sessions will provide critical feedback while developing students' creative evaluation and analytical skills. Instructors will work with students to plan and develop unique, creative projects for their demo reels. An emphasis will be placed on quality standards, professionalism, project management, and networking in the animation community.

REQUIRED TEXTS AND/OR RESOURCES

Resource material will be provided by the instructor/s.

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- Research a specialized field of study in general field of modeling/texturing/rigging/lighting and apply the knowledge to a self-directed portfolio project;

- Demonstrate high level of technical and artistic achievement in animation;

- Compile an industry relevant portfolio demonstrating professional animation skills;
- Create an online presence that showcases their work in the form of a blog or a website.
