COURSE FORMAT

3 hours of classroom contact per week for a 15-week semester, which includes the two-week final exams period. 1 additional hour per week may include direct classroom instruction, workshops, individual or small group meetings, tutorials, and online activities.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

EAL 078 with a minimum grade of B, or the Capilano EAP Placement Test at the EAP 080 level in Reading & Vocabulary

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course provides students with English language skills starting at the Upper Intermediate level. It includes reading (relating reading to own knowledge, determining accuracy of information) and vocabulary building (expanding vocabulary recognition skills, context clue knowledge, making inferences).

COURSE NOTE

Completion of any EAL part-time course does not meet the prerequisite for any EAP full-time course.

REQUIRED TEXTS AND/OR RESOURCES

Specific texts, resources and technology will vary depending on the instructor. The instructor may make use of an assigned textbook and/or instructor-prepared materials made available in class or on eLearn.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

Reading/Vocabulary

 Apply strategies for dealing with unfamiliar vocabulary, including using context clues, word structure (prefixes, suffixes, and roots), and guessing the meaning of unknown words, phrases, or idioms from context clues.

- Recognize an expanded inventory of concrete, abstract, conceptual, and technical terms and some idioms.
- Use a unilingual dictionary when reading for confirmation or precision.
- Identify and paraphrase purpose, main ideas, key words, and supporting details in 6-8 paragraphs descriptive or narrative texts.
- Skim and scan longer texts for main ideas and specific information, identifying logical links and key details in moderately complex contexts.
- Understand and interpret social messages, including emails and letters expressing appreciation, complaint, hope, satisfaction, and dissatisfaction, identifying purpose, context, and implied meanings.
- Follow 10 to 13 step clear and explicit instructions for procedures related to familiar technical and non-technical tasks, interpreting sequence and location signals.
- Distinguish facts from opinions, evaluate ideas in text to draw conclusions, and integrate, compare, contrast, and explain and interpret information.
- Locate and compare 3 or 4 pieces of information in extensive and visually complex online or print reference sources.
- Demonstrate understanding of an increasing range of complex structures and develop understanding for low-frequency structures.

Academic Literacy

- Use classroom interaction skills appropriate to this level.
- Develop critical thinking skills appropriate to this level.

Experiential Learning

- Identify and interact with some of the student support services available on campus.
- Be aware of the services and programs offered by social organizations located in the community.
- Understand how volunteer work contributes to an understanding of the values of equity, diversity, and inclusiveness.

Honouring Indigenous Ways of Learning and Knowing

- Develop an understanding of Indigenous Peoples and topics.
- Understand the importance of land acknowledgements.
- Distinguish unique characteristics of Indigenous cultures through stories and traditions.

COURSE CONTENT

Reading/Vocabulary

- Pronunciation strategies for new vocabulary
- Vocabulary expansion through word structure (prefixes, suffixes, and roots)
- Recognition of an expanded inventory of common, abstract, conceptual, and technical terms, including idioms
- Use of a unilingual dictionary for confirmation and precision
- Skimming and scanning for main ideas and specific information
- Organization of passages and identification of logical links between paragraphs
- Paraphrasing of purpose, main ideas, and key details in 8-10 paragraphs descriptive, narrative, or argumentative texts
- Interpretation of social messages, including emails, notes, and letters, and identification of purpose, context, and implied meanings
- Extended multi-step instructions and interpretation of information in moderately complex formatted and unformatted texts
- Distinguishing facts from opinions, evaluation of ideas in texts to draw conclusions, and comparison with own opinion
- Locating, integrating, and comparing 3 or 4 pieces of information from extensive and visually complex online or print reference sources
- Understanding and presenting information from moderately complex charts, graphs, diagrams, and website navigation menus
- Comprehension of complex sentences and structures, with several low-frequency complex structures.

Participation

Participation grades are based on completion of homework tasks and class preparation, as well as the consistency, quality, and frequency of contributions to class discussions. Consistency means attending every class, maintaining a positive and respectful presence in the classroom, and actively contributing to discussions on a regular basis. Quality means demonstrating respect for peers and their contributions, listening attentively when the instructor or other students are speaking, and participating in all activities with an open and inquisitive mind.

Experiential Learning (EL)

Includes reflecting on everyday common and professional interactions. Evaluation of EL is at the discretion of the instructor and may include individual presentations, reflective journals, e-portfolios, and written reports.

Assignments

Assignments include listening comprehension exercises, vocabulary, in-class discussions & presentations, and pronunciation practice.

- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of another student from a stack of papers);
- Falsifying one's own and/or other students' attendance in a course;
