COURSE FORMAT

3 hours of classroom contact per week for a 15-week semester, which includes the two-week final exams period. 1 additional hour per week may include direct classroom instruction, workshops, individual or small group meetings, tutorials, and online activities.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

EAL 087 with a minimum grade of B, or the Capilano EAP Placement Test at the EAP 090 level in Listening & Speaking.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course further develops students' English language skills starting at the Lower Advanced level. It includes listening (critical listening, extensive note-taking, evaluating spoken arguments), speaking (advanced presentations, debates, discussions), and pronunciation (refined stress, rhythm, and intonation).

COURSE NOTE

Completion of any EAL part-time course does not meet the prerequisite for any EAP full-time course.

REQUIRED TEXTS AND/OR RESOURCES

Specific texts, resources and technology will vary depending on the instructor. The instructor may make use of an assigned textbook and/or instructor-prepared materials made available in class or on eLearn.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

Listening/Speaking

- Recognize detailed facts, opinions, implied meanings, and functional expressions in complex social exchanges, including criticism, suggestion, recommendation, persuasion, agreement, disagreement, and cultural references.
- Give comprehensive presentations summarizing and analyzing information from multiple sources, tell detailed and hypothetical stories, and describe, compare, and contrast complex subjects, including researched topics.
- Differentiate between formal and informal speech, context, relationships, intent, emotional tone, or mood in a wide range of familiar and unfamiliar contexts.
- Comprehend and give complex, multi-step technical and non-technical instructions, including those requiring interpretation of implied steps and sequences.
- Engage in and sustain lengthy, in-depth conversations on both familiar and unfamiliar subjects using coherent, connected, and articulate speech at a normal to fast rate.
- Apply advanced techniques to handle, recover from, and prevent communication breakdowns effectively in demanding and unpredictable contexts.
- Apply listening skills to write down comprehensive and detailed spoken information accurately, including critical comprehension of extensive lectures or presentations.
- Evaluate suggestions or proposed solutions from multiple perspectives, assessing for appropriateness, usefulness, relevance, and validity.
- Indicate problems in a familiar area and recommend/propose solutions or changes to address them effectively.
- Participate actively in group debates, discussions, and meetings on abstract familiar topics/issues to gather, analyze, summarize, and compare information needed for decision-making; express, analyze, and qualify opinions and feelings; add information and elaborate; express doubts and concerns; and oppose or support a stand/proposed solution.
- Manage a range of personal, business, and academic interactions using appropriate assertive communication strategies to express and/or respond to expressions of respect, friendliness, distance, and indifference.
- Raise an issue with an authority figure/group in person or on the phone, present a persuasive argument on how to address it, and ask for agreement in a sensitive manner.

Pronunciation

- Demonstrate advanced fluency and comprehensibility of speech appropriate to this level.
- Demonstrate a refined ability to self-correct speech.

Academic literacy

- Use effective classroom interaction skills appropriate to this level.
- Develop critical thinking skills appropriate to this level.

Experiential Learning

- Identify and interact with some of the student support services available on campus.
- Be aware of the services and programs offered by social organizations located in the community.
- Understand how volunteer work contributes to an understanding of the values of equity, diversity, and inclusiveness.

Honouring Indigenous Ways of Learning and Knowing

- Develop an understanding of Indigenous Peoples and topics.
- Be aware of key historical events and features in the colonization of Canada.
- Distinguish unique characteristics of Indigenous cultures and worldviews through literary and academic sources.
- Understand the importance of land acknowledgements.

COURSE CONTENT

Listening/Speaking

- Advanced communication strategies: Asking for repetition, clarification, or confirmation in complex and varied contexts.
- Comprehension and creation of sophisticated questions, statements, commands, and expressions of courtesy.
- Effective communication on specialized and abstract discussion topics: Including research-based and technical subjects.
- Structured presentations on complex topics: Including hypothetical scenarios, detailed analyses, and research findings.
- Comprehension of discussions on a variety of advanced topics: Using critical listening strategies.
- Advanced listening strategies for taking comprehensive and organized notes from lengthy and varied aural sources.

Pronunciation

- Vowel and consonant identification and practice.
- Stress, reduction, rhythm, and intonation identification and practice.
- Word ending identification and practice with increased complexity and variety.

Note: While the weighting of individual assignments, tests, and exams is at the discretion of the instructor, no single assignment, test or exams will exceed 25% of the total evaluation.

Participation

Participation grades are based on completion of homework tasks and class preparation, as well as the consistency, quality, and frequency of contributions to class discussions. Consistency means attending every class, maintaining a positive and respectful presence in the classroom, and actively contributing to discussions on a regular basis. Quality means demonstrating respect for peers and their contributions, listening attentively during lectures and when other students are speaking, and participating in all activities with an open and inquisitive mind.

Experiential Learning (EL)

Students are expected to participate in Experiential Learning activities over the term. Evaluation of EL is at the discretion of the instructor and may include individual presentations, reflective journals, e-portfolios, and written reports.

Assignments

Assignments include listening comprehension exercises, in-class discussions/presentations, and pronunciation practice.

Cheating: Using or providing unauthorized aids, assistance or materials while preparing or completing assessments, or when completing practical work (in clinical, practicum, or lab settings), including but not limited to the following:

- Copying or attempting to copy the work of another during an assessment;
- Communicating work to another student during an examination;
- Using unauthorized aids, notes, or electronic devices or means during an examination;
- Unauthorized possession of an assessment or answer key; and/or,
- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of another student from a stack of papers);
- Falsifying one's own and/or other students' attendance in a course;
- Impersonating or allowing the impersonation of an individual;
- Modifying a graded assessment then submitting it for re-grading; or,
- Assisting or attempting to assist another person to commit any breach of academic integrity.
