COURSE FORMAT

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15-week semester.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

45 credits of 100-level or higher coursework.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This team-taught, modular course provides students with an introduction to aspects of visual communication, including drawing, photography, and communication design, framed around a current Indigenous theme. Through a study of storytelling, objective observation, image composition, and visual hierarchy, students learn how to articulate ideas, artifacts and knowledge in a visually coherent fashion. The course is designed for students with an interest in, but not necessarily prior immersion in, the visual arts.

REQUIRED TEXTS AND/OR RESOURCES

Details on recommended texts and readings, if any, will be supplied by the instructor. Students need access to a digital SLR camera, a laptop, and the Adobe CC campus license. A sketchbook should be brought to class 1.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- Observe the natural world and render it in a variety of mediums;
- Operate a digital camera to capture well-composed and well-lit images;
- Undertake raster-based image editing using industry-standard software;
- Organize information using principles of design and typographic hierarchy;
- Convey thematic storytelling using a variety of media;

 Analyze the efficacy of visual communication examples with respect to different audience types and end-uses; and

• Synthesize learning to produce a final professional presentation.

Academic dishonesty is any act that breaches one or more of the principles of academic integrity. Acts of academic dishonesty may include but are not limited to the following types:

Cheating: Using or providing unauthorized aids, assistance or materials while preparing or completing assessments, or when completing practical work (in clinical, practicum, or lab settings), including but not limited to the following:

- Copying or attempting to copy the work of another during an assessment;
- Communicating work to another student during an examination;
- Using unauthorized aids, notes, or electronic devices or means during an examination;
- Unauthorized possession of an assessment or answer key; and/or,
- Submitting of a substantially similar assessment by two or more students, except in the case where such submission is specifically authorized by the instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

• Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting and removing such work from a photocopier or printer, or collecting the graded work of another student from a stack of papers);

- Falsifying one's own and/or other students' attendance in a course;
- Impersonating or allowing the impersonation of an individual;
- Modifying a graded assessment then submitting it for re-grading; or,
- Assisting or attempting to assist another person to commit any breach of academic integrity.

Punctuality/Penalties for Lateness

Punctuality is essential. Students more than 15 minutes late for class, or students who leave early without instructor permission, risk being marked absent.

Professional Behaviour

Students should demonstrate a professional attitude and behaviour towards their work, their fellow students and their instructors. Reliability, a willingness to work cooperatively under sometimes difficult conditions, and a determination to achieve quality work to deadlines are all expected. Students must respect equipment and procedures, and should be receptive to constructive criticism of their work.
