COURSE FORMAT

4 instructional hours per week for 15 weeks.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

JAZZ 130 with grade of C- or higher

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course builds upon JAZZ 130 and 131 by integrating concepts of harmonic, melodic, and formal logic through analysis, performance, and composition. Theoretical concepts taught in this course are designed to support performance-based studies in JAZZ 282. Students will learn to use computer notation software to complete essential tasks such as creating lead sheets, parts for rhythm section, and parts for common wind and brass instruments.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- use computer notation software to complete essential tasks such as creating lead sheets, parts for rhythm section, and parts for common wind and brass instruments;
- demonstrate through composition an understanding of both linear and harmonic dimensions of traditional jazz literature;
- analyze and articulate formal aspects of tune construction;
- understand the relationships between classical and jazz composition and theory.

COURSE CONTENT

Unit	Subject
1	The conventions of notational practices in jazz.
2	Melodic Studies: rhythmic, lyrical, stylistic and phrase-form considerations.
3	Harmonic Analysis: Function, root motion, cadences/dc's, secondary/sequential/sub., V's/ii-V's, chord scales/stacks.
4	Reharmonization: harmonic rhythm, tonicization/modulation, leading/elaborating, pivot chords, slash chords (inversions, upper structure triads, hybrids), tertian voicings.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:
