#### **COURSE FORMAT**

Two lecture hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered as one instructor-led lab for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

#### **COURSE PREREQUISITES**

JAZZ 231 with a grade of C or higher

#### **CALENDAR DESCRIPTION**

This course teaches basic arranging techniques for ensembles with rhythm section and 2 or 3 'lead' instruments. In this context, students will learn to arrange in a variety of linear and contrapuntal styles.

#### **COURSE NOTE**

JAZZ 304 is equivalent to JAZZ 272. Duplicate credit will not be granted for this course and JAZZ 272.

**COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES**

**On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:**

- Write for 2 or 3 instruments in a variety of parallel, linear, and contrapuntal styles;
- Write parts for woodwinds, brass, and rhythm section which are appropriate to the instrument and the idiom and which are clear and simple for the players to read;
- Reharmonize and rhythmically rephrase melodies from the jazz repertoire;
- Demonstrate through their creative output, a knowledge of the work of important arrangers from jazz history in terms of rhythmic, melodic, formal, and harmonic practices common to the idiom;
- Create arrangements of jazz standards with intro, endings, background figures, solo sections, and other components appropriate to the idiom;
- Demonstrate attention to detail and show evidence of the personal study habits and work ethic critical for professional success.

**COURSE CONTENT**

Unit	Topic
1	Review: parts and score layout, orchestration, instrumental ranges and transposition, rhythm section writing, introductions, endings, melodic embellishment, rhythmic rephrasing, and articulation. Assignment #1.
2	Two-part writing – parallel, linear, contrapuntal. Test #1.
3	Performance and recording sessions for Arrangement #1
4	Three-part writing; background writing; form; shout chorus. Assignment #2.
5	Performance and recording sessions for Arrangement #2. Test #2.

**Fraud:** Creation or use of falsified documents.

**Misuse or misrepresentation of sources:** Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

**Plagiarism:** Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

**Self-Plagiarism:** Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

**Prohibited Conduct:** The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:
