COURSE FORMAT:

Three hours of class time, with an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities, for 15 weeks which includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE PREREQUISITES: 45 credits of 100 level or higher coursework.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This research methods course introduces students to the design, implementation and analysis of single and mixed method research commonly used in the Humanities and Social Sciences with a particular emphasis on cross- and multi-disciplinary research projects. In particular, the course is designed to prepare students for upper-level undergraduate research as is required in the Liberal Studies Tutorials and Graduating Projects. In addition to developing their own research skills, students will cultivate a working understanding as to how research is conducted and analyzed in order for them to be able to think critically about and evaluate research and statistical claims made by sources such as the media, advertisers, business interests and politicians.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Successful students will be able to:

- Demonstrate (in exams, written assignments and original research) a breadth of knowledge of the current quantitative and qualitative research methods and statistics used in a variety of disciplines in the humanities and social sciences; concepts from the philosophy of science and the nature of scientific reasoning; an understanding of sampling and sampling error; how to appropriately use the various research methods and statistics and the limitations of each method; and how statistics can be used and interpreted
- Apply their understanding to develop a research question; conduct a literature review; prepare and present
 a proposal of research; and conduct and present a pilot study using one or more of the Humanities and
 Social Sciences methods introduced in the course.
- Demonstrate research skills, critical thinking, quantitative reasoning and analytical and synthesis skills in evaluating the limits of interpretations of research in their course assignments, including the research assignment.
- Communicate their critical analyses and applications in correct written research report formats and in an oral presentation of their research.

ASSIGNMENTS:

Exams: The final exam (25%) may contain short answer and short essay questions.

Assignments: Methods assignments will enable students to practice a variety of research methods in the

Humanities and Social Sciences. This will include a mix of in- and out-of-class

assignments.

Research Project: Part 1 – Proposal & Presentation (15%) and Part 2 – Pilot Study & Presentation (20%)

For the Research Project assignment, students may work individually or in small groups. Each student or group will choose a research topic relevant to current studies in one or more of the disciplines associated with the Humanities and/or Social Sciences and, in turn, select an appropriate method or mixed methods of inquiry to further investigate the topic. Students are encouraged to consider projects that engage with the Liberal Studies term theme for the given term.

For Part 1, students will complete a literature review and research proposal, which will be presented to the class, and to the course instructors for approval. The proposal will include an explanation of their choice of method of inquiry for the topic. If the proposal entails research with human participants, the research proposal will also include an ethics checklist and informed consent form.

In Part 2, once their proposal is approved, students will conduct a pilot study of their proposal, and present their findings in a presentation on the last day of classes. Each individual student will submit a research report in the citation style approved by the course instructor during the proposal phase of the project – e.g. APA, MLA, or CMS. Within the research report or paper, students will include a critical analysis of their proposed research study and its limitations, based on their experience with the pilot study. The research report is to be uploaded onto the moodle site on the day of the presentations.

OPERATIONAL DETAILS:

all work and hand in the original.
