COURSE FORMAT: Three hours of class time, with an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities, for 15 weeks which includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE PREREQUISITES: 45 credits of 100-level or higher courses including one of the following: ABA 312, CMNS 260, CMNS 262, DSGN 325, EDUC 373, EDUC 473, LAW 210, LBST 200, LBST 201, PSYC 213, MT 462 or TOUR 327.

Note: This is an approved Quantitative/Analytical course for baccalaureate degrees.

Note: This course is equivalent to LSBA 330. Duplicate credit will not be granted for this course and LSBA 330.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: This research methods course introduces students to the design, implementation and analysis of single and mixed method research commonly used in the Humanities and Social Sciences with an emphasis on cross- and multi-disciplinary research projects. The course is designed to prepare students for upper-level undergraduate research as required in the Liberal Studies Tutorials and Graduating Projects. In addition to developing their own research skills, students will cultivate a working understanding as to how research is conducted and analyzed in order for them to be able to think critically about and evaluate research and statistical claims made by sources such as the media, advertisers, business interests and politicians.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES: Successful students will be able to:

- Demonstrate (in exams, written assignments and original research) a breadth of knowledge of
 the current quantitative and qualitative research methods and statistics used in a variety of
 disciplines in the humanities and social sciences; concepts from the philosophy of science and
 the nature of scientific reasoning; an understanding of sampling and sampling error; how to
 appropriately use the various research methods and statistics and the limitations of each
 method; and how statistics can be used and interpreted.
- Apply their understanding of research and statistics while conducting and presenting an original research pilot project using one or more of the Humanities and Social Sciences methods introduced in the course.
- Demonstrate research skills, critical thinking, quantitative reasoning and analytical and synthesis skills in evaluating the limits of interpretations of research in their course assignments, including the research assignment.
- Communicate their critical analyses and applications in correct written research report formats and in an oral presentation of their research.
- Complete both independent and cooperative assignments, which would include an original research proposal and pilot study and a variety of applied assignments.
