STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

General

To give students an understanding of screen story structures and the screenplay's importance in the film making process.

Instructional

Upon successful completion of this course the student will be able to:

- * Analyze films from a writer's point of view.
- * Identify both internal and external screenplay structures.
- * Identify and apply the basic tools of screenplay writing.
- * Write short scripts in proper screenplay format.
- * Understand the concepts of story and character arc and text and subtext.

PROGRAM LEARNING OUTCOMES

Program Mission

The Motion Picture Arts Certificate program is designed for students who wish to gain an understanding of the basic functions of a film set and the professional practices of an industry-standard production. Areas of study include story development, pre-production, production, and post-production, with a focus on film crafts (camera, lighting, sound, grip, sets, props, etc.) technical skills and professional behaviour. Lecture, labs and project work combine to create a realistic and effective learning environment. The goal is to prepare students for an entry-level position in the professional motion

picture industry and to provide a foundation for independent filmmaking. This Certificate forms the 100-level of the Bachelor of Motion Picture Arts Degree program and of the Motion Picture Arts Diploma program.

Program Goals

Knowledge:

To introduce and provide access to current technologies and protocols of the motion picture production process from concept to completion at an introductory level.

To articulate, demonstrate and provide practice in the roles of various crew positions on a set.

Skills:

To enable students to apply appropriate management practices and procedures.

To encourage proper set etiquette and crew team-work.

Value:

To demonstrate and encourage industry standard professionalism.

PROGRAM STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of the certificate, students should be able to:

1. Describe the motion picture production process and demonstrate an introductory understanding of the roles of the producer, director, production designer, writer, editor and various crew positions on the set.
2. Implement at an entry level the scripting, development, production design, pre-production, production, post-production and delivery of short dramatic narrative independent films in a collaborative manner utilizing professional standard communication skills, protocols and techniques.
3. Acquire and apply appropriate management practices and procedures including the computational, intuitive, creative and technical skills involved in pre-production, production, post-production, such as screenplay development, breakdown, scheduling and budgeting, for small-scale projects.
4. Demonstrate keys to success, including attitude, teamwork, set etiquette, human/public relations, professional behavior and self-marketing in the established and emerging motion picture industry sectors.
5. Determine how aesthetic engagement can enable cultural contributions through the effective use of media.

- * Discussion of characteristics, character and character arc
- * **Putting it on paper**—Introduction of Concepts/High concepts
- * **Homework**—Create and write a concept for a 3 page scene

- * A system of work flow to get from idea to draft script
- * Critique of student—read aloud—3 page scene concepts
- * **Homework**— Create and write the event and structure for the 3 page scene

- ☐ **Homework**—Write 3 page scenes

- * Scene by scene analytic screening of a film with multi protagonist story structure
- * Discussion of characters arcs/similarities and differences re single protagonist structure.

- * Analytic screenings illustrating different usage of dialogue in film
- * Introduction of the screenplay’s usual journey from idea to silver screen
- * The basic structure of studios, production companies and agencies
- * Readers and the importance of their coverage
- * Usage of show scripts and spec scripts
- * **Homework**—Rewrite the dialogue in the 5 page scripts

WEEK 12:

- * Introduction to the basic building blocks of character driven drama
- * Relation of the building blocks to the classic 3 act structure
- * Scene by scene analytic screening of part of a character driven drama film
- * Discussion of rewriting for the mythic beats in the story
- * **Homework**—Complete/rewrite the 5 page script for submission

- * **DUE DATE: Assignment #4** - Delivery of the 5 page scripts
- * Completion of the analytic screening of character driven drama film
- * View and analyze some bad screenwriting
