COURSE FORMAT

Four lecture hours per week for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course explores music as a dynamic cultural force across time, place, and identity. Musical concepts and forms from various time periods, diverse cultures, and traditions are introduced and explored, with attention to how music reflects and shapes social, political, and historical contexts. Through listening, discussion, and writing, students will inquire into music's role in creating meaning and shaping identity. Emphasis is placed on developing historical awareness, cultural empathy, and academic writing skills, while fostering a deeper understanding of music's role in diverse communities and movements.

Description of Assignments:

Listening Guide Assignment

Students will create a listening guide based on one of the Listening Journal pieces played each week in class. The listening guide will include information on the performance as well as a basic outline of the structure with a description.

Concert Attendance

The Concert Attendance grade is based on the student's attendance at the Cap Classics and Re Sounding CapU concerts which take place numerous times during the semester during the concert block. If unable to attend, students are allowed to attend an outside concert of Art Music and submit a brief concert review, along with a program and/or ticket.

Listening Journal

Students will record thoughts and impressions of listening examples and class discussions. The Journal can be submitted in written form, or another form approved by instructor.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:
