### **COURSE FORMAT**

#### **CALENDAR DESCRIPTION**

This course introduces students to a range of technologies that support and enhance the work of musicians. Topics include audio and video recording and editing, podcast production, music notation software, MIDI applications, and website development. Students will gain practical skills in creating and sharing high-quality recordings of their musical performances—useful for auditions and professional portfolios—as well as tools for effective self-promotion and digital presence.

### REQUIRED TEXTS AND/OR RESOURCES

- Edit and produce high-quality audio and video recordings using digital audio workstations, incorporating techniques such as multitrack recording, clicktracks, and sound file transfer to create polished materials suitable for professional use.
- Design and develop a professional self-promotion website, incorporating basic HTML, multimedia content, and tools such as QR codes to enhance accessibility and audience engagement.

**Fraud**: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

**Plagiarism**: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

**Self-Plagiarism**: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

**Prohibited Conduct**: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:
