- Apply measurement skills, problem solving and computation in live entertainment set construction and conceptual design;
- Examine knowledge of physics in lighting and sound design areas;
- Understand and interpret the design areas into a realized form for performance.

#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

### General:

This course is a study of the theory, techniques, and practice of creating scenic art for the stage. Students will explore colour, line, and shape as it relates to theatrical form.

### Course Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- handle materials and tools used by the scenic artist;
- work with a variety of different scenic surfaces;
- communicate with a scenic designer;
- replicate a set design through a variety of learned skills;
- explore painting using image transfer and layout and advanced colour matching;
- manage and collaborate in a team situation.
